


THE COLLECTION

THE CABC COLLECTION CONTINUES:





CABC SPACE AS AN EXHIBITION AREA:





CCC PROFESSIONAL SERVICES PROGRAM

The Canadian Crafts Council has just annouced a new Professional Services Program (PSP). Designed by craft professionals for craft professionals, the PSP will bring information and services directly to those individuals who need accurate, up-to-date information on which to base important business and professional decisions.

The CCC Professional Services Program will be officially launched on April 1, 1986. Forty individuals have already signed up.

PSP subscriptions are only available to individuals and not to groups or institutions. Information provided under the Program is for the exclusive use of subscribers.

THE CANADA COUNCIL and the Gershon Iskiwitz Foundation of Toronto, announced a major new prize in the visual arts. The prize, worth \$25,000 will be awarded first in December 1986. It is intended to honor a professional Canadian visual artist who has achieved maturity and a measure of success, and who is still in his or her field.

The prize, which will be awarded from time to time. will be administered by the Canada Council. Laureates will be selected from amoung the candidates in the Council's visual arts competitions. The Foundation will be responsible for the final selection of the laureate, in consultation with the Council. FEDERAL SALES TAX ON CRAFTS - THE LATEST: From CCC Bulletin

Our Special Bulletin of October 1985 carried the bad news that because of a court ruling incorporated craftspeople were now required to charge FST.

Now the good news - or at least better news. Since this decision was made public CCC has been extremely active. President Brian Segal has met the Minister of Revenue, the Hon. Elmer Mackay, and various ministerial aides and Government officers in Revenue and Finance. We have the active support of the Minister of Communications, the Hon. Marcel Masse, and his officers.

The result of this flurry of activity is that the federal government now recognizes the inequity inherent in the court decision and has undertaken to resolve the situation as soon as possible, Reading between the lines we assume the remedy will be favourable, ie. that it will restore the status quo.

In the meantime,

Any craftsperson who is being pressed to register for FST because they are incorporated should write to CCC immediately, with copies of correspondence.

Anyone should feel free to write to the Hon. Michael Wilson, Minister of Finance, with copies to Hon. Elmer Mackay urging them to restore the FST exemption for all craftspeople regardless of their legal status. CCC will keep you informed, and we ask all associations to circulate this information in their newsletters.

REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES REPORT

It's a cool snowy night here in Rossland. After two trips to Red Mtn. (why are 11 year olds so careless with their expensive equipment?) I am finally sitting down to re-read and contemplate the letters I have received since my column appeared in the CABC newsletter and since I wrote to my regional reps. I haven't phoned any reps yet, as it was my mandate to do, as the cost of calls concerns me. I will phone a few people just to get a sampling of ideas. The budget (or lack of) will not allow calls to everyone.

I had a pleasant surprise when a call came in one day from Ron David in Prince George. We talked a long time about all facets of CABC and what it can do for us in the outlying areas. The Northern people were unhappy that the AGM last June was cancelled in PG because not enough people wanted to travel that far. I understand all sides but I can understand the disappointment that was felt. Crafts people in the outlying regions are very important to the CABC organization to make it a truly viable operation.

I heard by letter from three craftspeople and was quite excited about some ideas that were mentioned and about the energy being put out. One suggestion was that a craft market survey or review be published. My understanding is that the craftspeople who have been at fairs are reviewed in a bi-monthly or monthly publication. Also mentioned was the need for regional funding (two people mentioned this) even just for mailing, printing etc. The Provincial government is probably not a good source but what about the Federal government? What about donating crafts for a fund raiser to establish a regional budget?

Another letter stated "as members of the CABC we feel it important that the regional influence be stronger. The Vancouver craft community has access to numerous events and information. Under the umbrella of the CABC the regional reps should have more control over how and where membership dollars are spent."

Most letters believed the membership could be higher. One suggestion was that \$20.00 per year be paid for each service used, i.e. 'Made by Hand', Portfolio

Registry etc. with the option not to pay and not to use them. The original membership fee would still stand.

One craftsperson stated that she thought that B.C. craft should be self supporting with the main source of income a retail outlet. She said "I look to the CABC as an important source of information and opportunities that I am willing to pay for. I don't think a reasonable charge for service rendered is going to exclude anybody from participating".

Thank you all for taking time to write. I also received a newsletter from the Ponderosa Spinners Weavers and Fibre Artists (I think I am partially responsible for that long handle) in the Okanagan with an announcement of my appointment in it. I am a past president of that group and my heart remains with them.

Some past events have been mentioned to me. The 4th annual Christmas craft fair at Pinantan Lake 20 miles from Kamloops was a great success, says Chuck St. John, one of our regional reps. People are willing to drive a long way for a good fair.

The Ponderosa Guild is planning a Retreat in May. Check for ads in the newsletter for this.

I am on the Board of Directors of the Kootenay-Boundary Artisans Alliance. We are having growing pains as everyone does. We are having our annual general meeting on March 15, when we shall have an election of officers and a review of portfolios and how to have a good one. We have a show called "A Show of Hands" which will be travelling across Canada for at least two years. A few of us are preparing for the Arts Council Juried Show that will go to the Festival of Arts in Prince George and then to Vancouver during EXPO. Some of us are preparing for the EXPO gallery and some of the fashion shows that are taking place at EXPO.

I find that I am in a chronic state of exhaustion as I work as a part time Lab tech, mother of two active children, balance the schedule of a too busy husband, maintain a fitness program of running, cross-country skiing or downhill skiing, plus work at what I consider to be a full time job, my craft. I know your lives are probably no different than mine except you may not, in a slightly tizzy moment, agree to join a relay team to run from Banff to Jasper, It's probably all uphill! All the time I have to run is not enough training I need to do the distance (what it is I'm not sure).

I really enjoy your letter so keep them rolling in. The winters in Rossland are long and snowy, so all outside news really brightens my life. My address is:

REPORT ON BOARD MEETING FEBRUARY 3, 1986

Brian Thorsteinson

Finance: January sales were up \$1500 over 1985 sales. We have hired Bill Haberl, Chartered Accountant, to bring our books up to date and maintain monthly accounts. We will be put on his computer and hopefully, we will be able to receive financial information more quickly and on a per-craft basis. IE how much money pottery or textiles bring in each month.

Jane is preparing monthly budgets and will also be taking over the daily bookkeeping while Stella deserts us for her 6 month sojourn in Britain. We have asked Stella to give us full monthly reports on the craft business over there. We have not had a printable reply from her on this subject yet.

Management. With the implementation of a 3 hr. parking limit on the Island, the Board has agreed to provide 3 paid spaces for staff at least until the end of Expo.

Granville Island. Circle Craft is moving (we don't know when yet — but very soon) into the Kwick Save space. The Island has big plans for the Net Loft and we are to be the central feature of it. The rent has increased, and the space decreased but it is hoped that with the large outside window we will be more visible to the public and hopefully make more profit. We are still paying less than market value for the space. We will have approximately 1/3 less space than we are presently using.

Expo. Jo Darts has been hired by the coalition of CABC and Circle Craft to manage our Expo store. At time of writing we have just had the contract signed (after 9 months -- a full term pregnancy), so we are now legal. Many thanks to Chris Sanderson who donated many valuable hours of his time dealing with the contract and the Expo lawyers.

Selections. We have asked Patricia Anderson and Anne Gaze to continue on the Selections Committee until our elections are held. See ballot form enclosed. Unfortunately, James Sutherland has resigned from the committee due to increased business which takes him out of town quite a bit and the Board will be selecting someone to take James' place.

Membership. The issue of the cumbersomeness of the Xmas inventory procedure and the awkwardness of our no exchange policy was raised. With the new system of numbering we are now employing, we will not need to do our usual Xmas withdrawal and resubmission of crafts. Unfortunately, the no exchange policy will have to remain in effect for now until we are able to streamline our system.

A reminder that the Canadian Crafts Conference will be held here this year in August. Cost is \$585 to participate and the agenda is now available.
