The remaining funds will assist community groups to hold a variety of activities, such as reunions, displays and concerts.

JOEL BERMAN has been commissioned by the law firm of Ladner Downs to design and sandblast etch a series of glass partitions covering 1500 sq. ft. The artwork comprises an abstract landscape type design.

Second commission has been awarded to Joel Berman to design and fabricate a boardroom wall for the offices of Lignum Lumber Sales Ltd., located on the top floor of Park Place. The wall consists of a series of panels that include leading, sandblast and kiln fired techniques, framed in stainless steel.

U.S. ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) ANNOUNCES ASBESTOS BAN.

The following information is extracted from Art Hazard News published by the Centre for Occupational Hazards, New York.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has announced its proposed rules for banning all uses of asbestos. EPA Administrator Lee M. Thomas said human health not monetary cost, was the Agency's foremost concern. However the EPA determined that the benefits of avoiding cancer from the asbestos over that period would more than outweigh the costs of banning the substance.

The agency has proposed an immediate ban on five product categories that now contain from one-third to one-half of the approximately 300,000 metric tons of asbestos used by U.S. manufacturers each year. If instituted, this ban would prohibit the sale and use of asbestos tile, roofing, flooring felt, asbestos cement pipes and fittings, vinyl asbestos floor tiles, and asbestos clothing. Thomas notes that there are effective substitutes available for these products. In addition to the immediate ban, asbestos importation and manufacture would be phased out over the next 10 years for all other products, including items like brake and clutch linings, as asbestos substitutes are developed.

TOURISM PLANNING AND THE ARTS - Genevieve Lemarchand "Tourism on Line" January issue Tourism Industry Association of B.C.

It is simply amazing that a province claiming tourism as its second industry does so little to develop strategies that incorporate tourist-related activities and services into local development plans.

Other growth industries use natural and/or man-made resources, target its market, develop secondary products, motivate its labour force to work towards common goals, intergrate new ideas into R and D programmes and, then effectively promote and market all aspects of the industry. The B.C. tourism industry promotes first. The only planning attempts have been from the top down. Tourist resources other than the natural ones have been largely ignored. Implementation of any strategy has been difficult because planning at the local level has not been coordinated.

Lack of pride in what we have at home seems to be a Canadian trait. There may be good reasons: the Canadian identity is largely promoted out of central Canada, regional differences are not much praised by the mass media, and the realities of multiculturalism have been shaded by official languages policies. So, we play it safe and use American recipes, neglecting to add Canadian ingredients, the very flavour which would make us different!

After Europe, the U.S. have recognized the value of cultural resources for the tourism industry, and have linked it to the economic and cultural vitality of a place. Among those resources are historical buildings and architectural features, street design and animation, public art, museum and gallery exhibits, theatre and music performances, and special events designed around the local resources by those people who have a vision of their potential.

A good example is the ski resort of Aspen, Colorado, where the Arts have contributed to the area's growth and development and are now a basic industry, a large part of the export economy. In 1945 a Chicago businessman, Walter Paepke, discovered this declined mining town and, enthused by its beauty, dreamed of creating in it the American counterpart of the Salzburg Music Festival. He formed one company to develop the real estate, another to develop the mountain. In 1949, he insisted the Goethe Bicentennial Celebrations be held in Aspen (instead of Chicago) and be associated with a music festival, which has now become an annual event. Other organization followed, such as the Aspen institute for Humanistic Studies, with its famous Executive Seminars and the Aspen Center for the Visual Arts. Ballet Aspen started in 1982 and sponsors performances by a range of dance troupe American Theatre Co. started a resident theatre group in 1977 which would have failed, were it not for the idea of organizing a playwrights' conference, now an annual event, and the yearly Snowmass Festival they help to organize. In 1982, the Music School brought 900 students and 255 faculty members, who spent \$2.2 million in the community. Audiences of 78,000 to the three festivals spent \$4.5 million. The total increase in business volum arising from these expenditures was \$14.4 million.

Numerous economic impart studies have shown that the Arts can be taken seriously as an industry in its own right, generating output, employing people, contributing in a dollar and cent way to the local economy. In New York, the Arts generate \$2 billion in personal income, 117,000 jobs and an additional impact of \$2.6 billion in the metropolitan economy. Of a total audience of 64 million, one fifth come from outside the region, and 42% of these come specifically for the Arts.

In Seattle, the recent "China 7,000 Years of Discovery" attracted 2,729,137 visitors over a 6 month period, 40% of whom came from outside the King County areas. The total economic impact was estimated at \$36 milliom. In the same city, two thirds of the Wagner Festival audience comes from outside the county and generates and impact of \$20, million to the State.

In Toronto, 100,000 of the 780,000 visitors to the "Treasures of Tutankhamun" came from outside the province and spent \$26,000.00 while in the city.

It could not be stressed enough that today's tourist has a strong interest in cultural events and environmental amenities. Each community has its share of resources, talents and creativity, which, if recognized and supported by a community-wide effort, could have an enormous impact in focussing the future economics of that place. In the U.S., renovation and historical preservation currently create 109 jobs per million dollar contract, compared with 70 jobs for demolition and new construction. In Pioneer Square, in Seattle, assessment has increased 450% in four years. Employment went from 1,000 jobs in 1970 to 6,000 in 1980. In Old Sacramento, California, 2.5 million tourists a year bring \$20,000,000 revenue and assessment went from \$500,000 to \$8,000,000 since renovation took

In B.C., tourists' cultural expenditures represent only 9% of their total expenditures. Yet, the talent pool is here and is good. The arts industry has shown an important increase in the past decade, when the arts labour force grew by 87% between 1971 and 1982, compared to 53% for the overall labour force.

It is up to each community to recognize its cultural resources, to support their development, rally around revitalization possibilities and special events, and to plan tourist-related activities and services which will benefit the local pupulation. Marketing the Arts shoul be part of the strategy and must support, rather than drive, a well-trained and well-funded human resource




