"NOTES" FROM THE OFFICE

The CABC gratefully acknowledges the financial support of the Government of British Columbia, through the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, Recreation and Culture. The operating assistance grant for 1989-90 is \$25,000.

A warm welcome was extended to Vancouver Island Regional Representative, Potter, Alan Burgess at the November 9th meeting of the Board of Directors.

Enquiries have come in from the B.C. Trade Develop-

ment Corporation to identify craftspeople making products of interest to overseas buyers and distributors.

CABC assistance has been extended to a project underway in the **West Kootenays** that includes marketing crafts in a Japanese sister city.

Canadian Airlines International have accepted with pleasure the CABC nomination for a Financial Post Award for Business in the Arts 1989. Last year our nominee in the same category, Sustained Support, Prince George Pulp and Paper was the winner!

CABC and Crafthouse assisted the owners of a new

The Leon and Thea Koerner Foundation have awarded \$2,147 towards the purchase of a computer and the necessary hardware and software. This coupled with a maximum of \$3,467 from the B.C. Lottery Fund Capital Grants Program and \$1,500 from the Department of Communications through the Canadian Crafts' Council for training along with an outstanding application into Canfor will make the CABC computer a reality in the new year!

The CABC/Crafthouse Design Vancouver project will bring together architects Grace Gordon-Collins and Ernest Collins; interior designers Elaine Thorsell, Celine

Pitre and Daryl McConnell in collaboration with craftspeople, to design and make functional everyday objects as possible prototypes for production. Watch for this presentation at Crafthouse, February 6«18, 1990.

NEW LOCATION

Since its beginnings in 1983 in a Gastown loft to its next studio on Granville Island in 1986, **Kakali Handmade Papers** has yet entered another growth. Beginning in January, 1990, the paper studio will move to an enlarged and improved production facility. The new location, still on Granville Island, occupies 2,400 sq. ft. and is designed specifically for papermaking. In addition there will be a new Sales/Wholesale department of papermaking supplies, books and other related materials. Rounding out this expansion will be an Education centre to inspire and nurture the making of handmade paper. **Sharyn Yuen**, the founder of Kakali HMP, will continue to instruct courses along with other local paper artists. In addition, out of town artists will be

included into the curriculum to lecture and share specific methods and artistic expressions on how they work with handmade paper. Studio space rental and support services will be available as well for those who continue to pursue the art of papermaking.

STATUS OF THE ARTIST

The Standing Committee on Communications and Culture of the House of Commons recently invited the Minister of Communications, Marcel Masse, to appear before it and speak on the subject. This he did in a two-hour appearance on 7 November, during which he also answered a number of questions. Furthermore, prior to his appearance, the Prime Minister, in answer to a question in the House, indicated that the Government intends to bring forward leglislation on the Status of the Artist. This is significant, since Prime Ministers do not usually answer questions that could be addressed by other Ministers, unless there is a real commitment being made.

CARFAC B.C. MEETING

Artists in the Vancouver Lower Mainland area, or B.C. artists who will be in Vancouver on Feb. 1, 1990, may want to take part in a special meeting on artists' and copyright at the Robson Square Media Centre at 7:30 pm. The mandate of

CARFAC is to protect and improve the professional status of all Canadian artists. It is a democratic, non-profit, artist-run organization with a large national membership and active representation in all provinces. Any professional visual artist or supporter can join. CARFAC was founded by Jack Chambers in 1968 and immediately began to establish the voluntary payment of fees to artists for temporary exhibitions. Today, most public galleries in Canada follow the CARFAC Standard Minimum Fees Schedule. Issues now being dealt with are the amendments to the Copyright Act, exhibition rights, reprography rights, etc.

MADE BY HAND: FELT AND PAPER

'ABOUT FACE' MASK EXHIBITIONS BEGIN NEW YEAR

A new year is often time to make resolutions for change, to put on a fresh face and begin again. At the Cartwright, a "new face" has literal meaning when two mask exhibitions open to the public on **January 12**, launching a new year and announcing the Gallery's major fundraising event, the Cartwright Carnevale.

The two exhibitions provide a splendid opportunity to examine masking in world cultures, to teach through mask performances, workshops and slide talks, that masks are a universal way that humans take on new identities—in traditional cultural festivals, or only for a night in our gala Venetian carnival! Both exhibitions continue through **February 26, 1990.**

NEW BUILDING, EXPANDED PROGRAMS

The Cartwright Gallery will expand into new quarters in 1992. A 10,000-square-foot building, designed by architect Paul Merrick, will be constructed to the Gallery's specifications as part of the Cathedral Place development of the Shon Group. The building, at the corner of Georgia and Hornby Streets in downtown Vancouver, will incorporate design elements of the Hotel Vancouver, which faces it, and the Georgia Medical Dental Building, which formerly stood on the site.

Maureen Maclachlan, President of the Gallery's Board of Trustees, says that they aspire to make the Cartwright Canada's premier crafts museum, representing the best of Canadian crafts in a permanent collection. Temporary exhibitions will showcase both Canadian and international crafts, emphasizing the creative achievements of artists working in glass, clay, metal, fibre and wood. Programs open to both Cartwright Gallery members and the general public will provide an educational adjunct to the exhibitions, and

will include lectures, craft demonstrations, film showings, seminars, art tours, and co-sponsorship of the annual Craftweek.


To help fulfill the Gallery's aspirations to become Canada's craft museum, the board has hired Lloyd E. Herman as the Gallery's director, and Paul Grant as its assistant director. Herman's fifteen years as founding director of the national craft museum of the United States, the Smithsonian Institution's Renwick Gallery in Washington, D.C., qualify him to plan the Cartwright's programs and the museum facilities of its new building. Grant, a Vancouver native, is a respected cultural organization administrator, and has recently returned to Vancouver from Saskatoon, where he was general manager of the Saskatoon Symphony for the past three years.

GIFTS TO COLLECTION

The Cartwright has accepted two recent additions to its permanent collection of Canadian crafts. Concurrently, the Gallery's trustees have adopted a policy governing the collection, which will be exhibited in the Gallery's new building.

American Express Company through its Gold and Platinum Card members, has purchased "Untitled #1," a glass and aluminum sculpture made in 1988 by Winlaw, B.C. artist Lou Lynn. The exhibition has not be organized chronologically but the 300 or so pieces have been arranged under the theme Wood in Finnish Lifestyle, Wood Shapes, Texture, Structure, Joints, Action, Motion, Ornament, Detail, Image, Space and Millieu. "The idea behind the organization is to let the past and the present greet each other and to show that every design has its basis in the past," says architect Juhani Pallasmaa, the main curator of the exhibition. Indeed interesting contrasts and, on the other hand, a feeling of historical continuity has resulted from this arrangement. The exhibition consists, in addition to the nicely placed actual wooden objects, of high quality pictures of buildings, churches and other structures in their natural milieu. An excellent catalogue that can be obtained from the gift shop of the museum has superb pictures and rather detailed descriptions that follow the show's organization and guides the spectator through the exhibition.

Wood is a living material. "It is the only material that grows only more beautiful with time and use," says Pallasmaa. Wood is, however, also a perishable material. Winds, water, fire and micro-organisms have destroyed most wooden structures of the ancient times. No wonder then that the main weight of the exhibition is on the objects of our time. Some truly old objects that have resisted the effect of time have, however, been included in the collection—the oldest, an elk's head, is radiocarbon dated 5800 BC. Man's interest in describing animals manifests in four other sculptures. A humorous work "Horses Head" by Viljo Makinen from 1967 made with wood and nails contrasts with a sculpture of riding

St. Matthew, a churchman from 13th century. "The Alder Skull" by Kain Tapper, a member of the exhibition work group, is another interpretation of the same theme. The sculpture simplifies the forms of the horses skull into basic geometric elements. Simplification is certainly one of the trends in modern Finnish decorative art. When comparing the painstakingly carved details of the front of the choir stall of the Hollola church from 1480s with the modern decoration "This Happened" by Kari Caven made of pieces of plywood nailed to a backboard, one cannot but wonder the changing values and differences in appreciation of art during different times.

Through some of the objects one can get glimpses of the Finnish history that does not lack times of anxiety. A piece of bark bread that tells about the great famine years of 1867-68 and times during the 1st World War. It was made from the phloem betwen the bark and cambium of a pine by drying, grinding and baking it as the real bread, that which was still being eaten in 1930s in some remote areas of Finland. Due to lack of materials in 1940s a pair of shoes were made by combing paper, cloth and wood. Other curious pieces telling their own history are the pauper statues, wooden invalids asking for a donation for the poor and sick, seen outside churches in Finland.


Creativity and craftsmanship meet in the child's chair that provides a feeding platform, possibility to place a pot underneath the seat and to use it as a rocking chair. This piece of practical art made of stained pine by an unknown carpenter is one of my favourite objects of the exhibition. Appreciation of natural materials starts in childhood. The creative wooden toys by Jorma Vennola and Pekka Korpijaakko have got world-wide recognition.

Generally speaking, wood is thought to be a rather inflexible and inexpressive material. I am sure that after seeing the exhibition one is ready to discard this concept. Wood is a versatile and flexible material. There are several examples in the show to prove that. The skillful sculpture "Hurricane" made of airplane plywood combines the rich pattern of layered wood and imaginative form of a whirlwind. This object by Tapio Wirkkala, one of the most famous Finnish designers, is certainly one of the masterpieces of the show. The furniture, designed by Alvar Aalto, Ilmari Tapiovaara and Yrjö Kukkapuro, as well, are examples of the flexibility of

wood. They have been made by bending birch plywood to a form that fulfills both functional and aesthetic requirements. The result is light and durable furniture with warm character. A sign of the timeless value of Alvar Aalto's chairs and tables is their continuing popularity. Despite being designed originally in the early 30s and despite the fact that already millions of them have been made, they are still the favourite furniture of the Finns who seek a natural warm feeling for their homes. Another example of the qualities of wood unsurpassed by other materials is the dog-drawn racing sleigh of Risto Kamunem. The wooden frame made of bent wood pieces joined together with thongs gives the sleigh light, durable and flexible property.

All in all, the exhibition gives an excellent cross section of the usage of wood and superb craftsmanship in Finland. In the meantime it's also about Finns past and present. So what has changed in the Finn over all these years? Superficially perhaps a lot of things. Under the polished surface, however, you can find pretty much the same Finn as hundreds of years ago. He doesn't know anything more satisfying than to put his skis on and head to snowy woods, or to go to his intolerably hot sauna and beat his naked body with vihta, a bunch of birch branches. Perhaps because of this lack of change the Finns still have their own unique style and sense of natural beauty that is so magnificently represented in "Language of Wood."
