





BRONFMAN WINNER

Louise Genest, world renowned Master Bookbinder and a leader among Canadian Bookbinders, has been named recipient of the 1995 Saidye Bronfman Award, Canada's preeminent distinction for excellence in the crafts.

Chosen from a diverse group of seventeen nominees celebrated for their creative contribution to Canadian crafts, Louise Genest was honoured for her inspiring, intuitive and passionate contribution to the bookbinding craft. The Award was presented on Nov. 14 in Montreal at the Canadian Centre for Architecture.

STATS

According Statistics Canada, attendance at theatres, music, dance, opera, and other performaing arts venues declined 2.5% between 1992/93 and 1993/94. On the other hand, after declining 0.5% in 1992/93, attendance at BC museums, art galleries, and other heritage institutions increased 3.8% in the 1993/94 fiscal year.


