My name is Sheila Hogarth and I have been appointed coordinator of Regional Development for CABC. I believe I have an understanding for this job because I'm a fibre artist who has lived in six or seven different regions in B.C. My past has found me (by order of appearance) in Prince George, Kamloops, Creston, White Rock, Vancouver, Merritt, Summerland, Kitimat. At the present I am living in Rossland, six minutes from Red Mountain, a shiers paradise, and yes, we do have job because

While in the Okanagan, I worked my way up the ranks of the Ponderosa Spinners and Weavers executive to president. I have also been a member of the Kitimat Weavers and Spinners. In Kitimat, I was programmer for Riverlodge recreation centre. That job was most valuable as I learned communications skills, plus how to make things happen in remote areas. It's tough but possible! At present I belong to the Kootenay Boundary Artisan Alliance, two weaving groups and the Trail Art Club. belong

If we want craft to be well represented throughout B.C. we as craftspeople have to be prepared to help financially.
