

The Canada Council for the Arts received 16 nominations for the Prix Saidye Bronfman Award this year. The CABC was please to nominate Tahltan-Tlingit artist, Dempsey Bob, for his highly skilled work in wood carving and bronze sculpture and for his dedication to teaching his art and allowing it to evolve naturally within his culture. As many craftspeople know, it is a great honour to be

nominated for the Bronfman Award and even if the nominee is not chosen, they can always use the prestige of being nominated to their benefit. Craft works by the recipient are acquired by the Canadian Museum of Civilization for its permanent collection. If there are funds remaining, additional works may be acquired from other nominees. The assessment committee met on June 20, and we all look forward to the results due to be released on September 15, 1998.

Canada Council for the Arts for craft grants decreased this year. For those craft artists who apply or have applied in the past - do not give up. It is not uncommon to be rejected a few times before receiving a grant. Although it may be a lot of work to prepare a submission, it is important to apply in order to show interest and a need for funding in this area. A decrease in applications communicates a lack of need and therefore threatens the future security of funding in craft categories.

Unfortunately, Margaret Dryden has resigned as Head of Visual Arts from the Canada Council. Margaret was a strong supporter of crafts and was integral in securing some of the current craft programming. There is an "acting" Head presently, but the Council is in the process of hiring a permanent person for the position. When asked what the crafts community could do to avoid any possible threats to our crafts component, it was suggested that we write to either Joanne Morrow, Director of the Arts Division or Dr. Shirley Thompson, Director, to extend our enthusiasm for the existing craft programs and expectation of the Council to continue their support once a new Head has been hired. In the retail space pedestals and walls were shaken by the force of the incoming water, causing some work to fall in the muddy water causing minor breakage. Computers, supplies, archival slides, artifacts and library books were damaged and worse. This has left the MCC with no home at present. The extent of the damage has not yet been calculated and it will take many months for conservators to assess the The Manitoba Crafts Council has suffered a terrible tragedy. On June 6, water and mud poured into the premises of the MCC as a result of a broken 8 inch water pipe from the city water line feeding the water sprinkler system of the 6 story heritage building that houses them and other non-profit arts groups (Artspace). This sent water with tremendous force into the MCC's retail shop museum collection

in action. Although there is insurance - the extent of the damage has yet to be determined and it may take months before they can physically regroup and move forward. You can still reach the MCC by the same phone number (204 947-0340) which is forwarding calls to a private line. The Manitoba Crafts Council needs everyone's support at this time. This is a terrible set-back for the MCC yet many are hard at work restoring what is left. A new temporary storefront for Craftspace is being sought, a restoration company is working with them and volunteers and committees



Volunteer profile: Sandra Ramos

Crafthouse's existence is due to the selfless volunteers who have donated many hours of their time to aid in the shop's success. Some are only able to work for half a day a week and for a duration of three months, others have been with Crafthouse for a year or more. Volunteering in Crafthouse is a challenging proposition - however never boring. Volunteers are faced with understanding the quirks of computers, electronic equipment, the work of over 150 craftspeople - how it's made and who the maker is, answering tourism questions, knowledge of shipping, keeping on top of sales and being outgoing with the 60,000 people who visit us each year. A tall order for unpaid work. Sandra Ramos is one such long-standing volunteer.

Sandra was born in Korea and at the age of five, her family immigrated to Montreal. She studied Fine Arts at McMaster University in Hamilton, ON and then went to Concordia University in Montréal, Québec where she studied design. This love of good design took her to Japan where she taught English for three years in a junior high school. She returned to Canada, now married to a shakuhachi flute player, and settled in Vancouver. A trip to Granville Island took her past Crafthouse and she saw the "Request for Volunteers" sign in our window and the rest is history. Besides volunteering here, she also volunteers for the Canadian Cancer Society, works at the Gallery of BC Ceramics, puts this newsletter together, takes pottery classes at Mudslinger Studio and enjoys local hiking!

Crafthouse says good-bye to Christina Erlach who volunteered on Sundays. She is taking the summer off and plans a trip to Paris and will return to us in the fall. As one door closes, others open and we now welcome Jennifer Slett, a student in the textile program at Capilano College and Hilary Keever who has a keen interest in the arts. I thank Andrea, Christina, Coralie, Elisabeth, Hilary, Jennifer, Sandra and Sharon for the tremendous help they give to me and Crafthouse!

Several new craftspeople have joined Crafthouse. Marlene Bowman lives in Sooke and started pottery at the age of forty. She was asked to join Crafthouse when her non-functional raku teapots and cups were seen at the Made in Clay show. Robert Ganz works with a clay mold (destroyed in the process) to form concrete garden sculpture. Marly Haller sculpts gilded papier mache floor lamps. The gilded surface is then oxidised and finally protected with several coats of Varathane. Goldsmith Susan Lefebour, from Toronto has sent us sterling silver and gold "crown" rings, some brooches and her jigsaw puzzle pins. Ayla McIninch makes beaded amulet necklaces incorporating stones such as amethyst, jade and rose quartz.. We have our first iron gate, made by blacksmith Tony Waterfall. Tony is from the Kootenays and studied with four blacksmiths before opening his own shop. Deanna Welters is a graduate in fine arts from Kwantlen University College and specialises in surface design on fabric. One of her magnificent hand painted silk banners is on display. Michelle Wilson's earthenware houses and cityscapes were also seen at the Made in Clay show. They are made from slabs, slump molded and contain

Sharmini Wiresekara sell their work here. The peyote stitch is used in the pendants and amulet bags. Essential for an even peyote stitch is a bead of very uniform size. Japanese Delica seed beads provide this uniformity. The beads are woven with a special nylon thread using fine, long beading needles. It is an off-loom process which creates a woven fabric of beads. The stitch has been traced as far back as 2200BC when it was used by the Egyptians in belts, bands, ceremonial aprons and burial garments. In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the Southern Plains Indians used the peyote stitch in association with their ceremonial objects which employed the sacred peyote cactus, hence its name was coined. The tubular peyote stitch is molded on a removable form, in a twill fashion, circularly downwards to the desired length. This body is then flattened and finished off using the rectangular flat-peyote stitch.

His initiation into the film industry came about through a friend in the prop department of the film industry, who suggested that he should get involved in it. Barry helped with a series of ads for BC Tel. He found that he enjoyed it and recalls the fun of decorating this big hall into a type of Baronial hunting lodge with stuffed animals, animal heads and rugs for their Vegetarians in Victoria ad.

"Everything you see on a screen whether in a video or film, whether its in an expensive apartment or garage, is placed there by the set decorating department," Barry says, "the designer comes out and gives his or her preferences and then the decorator gives us directions and we rent, purchase or make items and place them on the set. Later if they are not burnt or destroyed in the movie we remove or return them. I'm basically working as a labourer."

After the ad Barry became a permittee. That meant he was permitted to work in film, but was not yet a member of the union I.A.T.S.E. Barry explains how being a permittee works.

"Permittees are in every department. When the roster is filled and there are still other things to do they call permittees. The difficulty most of us have is that we have other work or something else happening where we can't work, but you have to go if you want to maintain status."

Barry was fortunate that his time was his own. He was also fortunate that one of his first calls was on the set of the TV series Millennium. A day call as a permittee may only last 12 hours. His stint with Millennium lasted four months. He went from there to work on other series such as the X files and Poltergeist.

Compared to creative work with his hand-made crafts, the experience is certainly different for Barry, but nevertheless rewarding. He sees the film industry as a creative endeavour continually evolving itself. He feels that most people involved in the film industry are very creative, as what is being created is very visual. The industry requires creative problem solving and openness to change. One of the biggest differences from his craft work is that hours may be spent putting together a set to create an image only to have it destroyed for the movie.

Although the days can be really long—12 hours is minimum and 14 hour days are more usual, the benefits for Barry are working with all sorts of people on all levels. He feels this is probably important for him because he worked on his own so long. Other social benefits come from the fast pace of the film industry.

with people. Its ar so big is achieved. "You have to let go of all confrontational stuff to let it work. You fall into a position of willingness to understand and work with people. Its amazing how something so big is achieved."

The flexibility of working in a movie or for a MOW (Movie of the Week) suits some people. Then they can get the opportunity to do their other work in between work in the film industry, but Barry enjoys the steady work involved in a series. "After seven or eight years as an artist, a regular cheque is really nice."

He came to Vancouver from England in the 60's working as a design artist for department stores. After being laid off, he returned to England for a time and worked with wood, making small items and working in the building industry. While in England, he attended a European toy show in London and as he saw the toys he started to get fired up about the possibility of working with colours and making something similar. However, it all clicked when he entered a shop called Cabaret Theatre in Covent Garden. He saw some of the pieces there as fascinating bits of engineering. On his return to Vancouver, he knew what he wanted to do, but the how eluded him. The rents being charged for workshop space were far more than he could afford. Then at a meeting he went to in Vancouver, someone offered him the opportunity to work in the Peter Finger building down on Barnard St. in South Vancouver. This space, where he has worked since 1990, has been perfect for

Barry apologizes for how many times he has said that he is fortunate the way things have worked out. But he does feel lucky that because of his work in the film industry, he can pay for his well equipped and located workshop. He obviously enjoys the experience of working on sets

"I'm a believer that the Universe will always provide you with what you want," Barry says, adding, "provided you know what you want rather than what you perceive to be your wants."
