

Photography for the Illustrated Directory has Started

It's like Christmas every day at the CABC offices! Packages of all shapes and sizes are yielding a wonderful cross section of crafts for photography and inclusion in the illustrated directory. Kelly Enno, our project photographer spent her first week arranging for lights and backdrops and all the odds and ends, such as needles, pins, dowels and masking tape that are needed to coax each item into a photogenic posture. Assisted by volunteers who help with the arranging of the items, Kelly spends her days wrestling with problems as diverse as controlling the reflections off a highly polished knife blade to hanging and lighting a 10' by 10' quilt.

To date we are indebted to a number of people for their advice and help: Diane Mortensen and Darlene Lownes have been particularly helpful with the arranging of the fabric arts. Ron Tribe lent his talents in the ceramic field and Frances Fraser, Leah Errington and Yves Trudeau have all spent time assisting in the studio

Meanwhile our mainstay volunteer Julie Armstrong has been keyboarding all the information from the completed surveys into the UBC computer and has run a special test run to make sure that everything is working as it should. One exciting aspect of the computer work is that Julie will be using UBC equipment in September that is so new that it has yet to be installed. This equipment will take the output from the computer and set it into type ready to paste up into the directory, "untouched by human hands" as it were! This is only one of the functions that the computer will perform. Others will include the tabulation of information and attitudes that will form the basis of a much-needed "Survey of the Craft Industry in British Columbia". Assisting Julie with all this work is Caroline Ferris, a student working with us for the summer under the auspices of a Federal/Provincial job creation program.

# BE SURE TO PACKAGE YOUR CRAFT CAREFULLY

We have been checking with our regional drop-off points and it seems that craft items are being left ready for us to arrange for shipment to Vancouver after July 8th. Our insurance covers items "appropriately packaged and protected for shipment", so we urge craftspeople to ensure that their items are carefully and properly packed. In cases where it is not practical to ship a craft item, we recommend that a good quality black and white photograph be submitted in its place.

# Minutes of the Last Annual General Meeting

# Explanation of Board Meetings Policy

Don MacArthur explained the rationale of the decision not to open up Board meetings to the general membership. The intent was not to stop Board/membership dialogue but rather use Board meeting time in the most efficient way. The decision did not prevent general members from making presentations to the Board since any member or group of members wishing to do so could request in advance to be included on the agenda.

# 2. Granville Island Craft Fair

Susan Bell outlined the negotiations between the various craft organizations and the Granville Island Trust regarding the possibility of a co-operative summer craft market venture to be held in the "Netloft". Arrangements were stalled when Mr. Hammond of the Trust went on holidays, and later when Vancouver City approvals were delayed. It was eventually decided not to proceed with a Circle Craft/CABC summer market venture at this time. Since that decision, Circle Craft Co-op is proceeding unilaterally with the market.

# Approval of the By-Laws

Robin Brammall advised the meeting that the proposed new By-Laws were not "cast in stone" and could be changed. However, he also commented that he felt the health of an Association could often be measured in terms of "getting on with the job" than an obsessive concern for the by-laws.

ION: Moved by Robin Brammall and seconded by Nancy Vivian that the By-Laws be approved as presented. All in favour.

# President's Report

Don MacArthur stated that since he had only served as president for part of the year, he would restrict his report to dealing with the TIDSA project and ask that the Directors deal with other projects in their individual reports.

The directory project is proceeding well under the direction of Mike Ovenell, working with temporary staff Kelly Enno and Caroline Ferris. He also thanked Julie Armstrong for her volunteer work on the survey and commended the TIDSA committee members: Ron Tribe, Thelma Ruck Keene, Madeleine Darling Peggy McLernon and Roger Dee. In reviewing the activities of CABC over the past year, Don stated that all the groundwork and planning that had been done was now being translated into action.

# Executive Director's Report - Gail Rogers

Gail Rogers recalled that CABC has been involved in some successes and some disappointments this year and now has a better understanding of its responsibilities and goals. There is exciting work to do for a future that bodes well for the craftsmen of B.C.

She thanked the Board of Directors for their generous support and recognized the group of volunteers and paid staff that has brought a renewed sense of purpose and vigour to the CABC.

Gail commended the Canadian Crafts Council for its valuable role in developing a crafts network across Canada.

# Finance - Roger Dee

Roger Dee presented the financial statements for the year ending April 30th, 1983. He explained that the deficit shown was partly the result of having to show the state of our finances on a given day ie. April 30th. Since then we have received the expected TIDSA funds, and we also have plans in place to sell the CABC notecards over an extended period. These factors reflect a possible net deficit for the period of about \$2,100 rather than the approximately \$10,000 figure shown. He pointed out that for the coming year, one of the major challenges facing the Board of Directors will be to ensure that existing means of funding are sustained and that new sources are developed. Copies of the complete financial statement and his accompanying report are available on request from the CABC office.

### Fiona Ahrens

Fiona Ahrens described the purpose of the CABC annual plan as a management tool that is revised on a quarterly basis. The plan clearly identified the groups that we are serving and set down the programs that are being undertaken. With directors appointed to look after specific portfolios, the Annual Plan helped us keep our minds on the day-to-day projects and problems.

## Artisans of B.C. Fiona Ahrens

Fiona reported that although the Artisans of B.C. exhibition had not been a financial success, CABC had learned a lot about the need to develop closer relations with the news media and how to organize and mount similar exhibitions in the future.

During June I had the opportunity of travelling to Vernon for "Creative Chaos" and to Prince George for the Studio 2880 fair - "Midsummer Madness". These two trips were enormously valuable as they provided an opportunity to meet with craftsmen who were in some cases, present members, past members or "never have been" members!

"Creative Chaos" is a community event and as such attracts thousands of people who come to buy from approximately 180 craftsmen. Sharon Larson, one of the volunteers who organized this event and the CABC Regional Representative for Vernon, was very helpful and I was most grateful for the contact.

On Saturday, June 11 Mike Ovenell, Project Co-ordinator for the illustrated directory, and I flew to Prince George with the kind generosity of PACIFIC WESTERN AIRLINES. Laura Fry a weaver and our past regional representative met us at the airport. The skies were slightly overcast but the rain held off for most of the day. The fair was considerably smaller that "Creative Chaos" and so we were able to speak with everyone. Again, a good number of those participating were members, but as well, some that were not. Ron David, a woodturner and the new regional representative for the area, and Pam Rodger and Linda Corneille, both potters, were selling their work or, in the case of Ron, selling balloons to aid the Prince George Art Gallery. Pam very graciously had us to her house that evening.

Some of our TIDSA money has been allocated for travel - this program paid for the trip to Vernon. As mentioned PWA provided the two passes for Prince George. Both sources are to be thanked and the value of such excursions can be measured in the increased memberships and the personal contact that comes from meeting people in their own areas.

Further to our conversation concerning the name Craftsmen's Association, here is a letter explaining my viewpoint which I would be grateful if you could pass on to the Board.

sexist title. At the time she said it was not possible to change the name for some obscure reason which escapes me now. At the time we said that we could not join an organization which ignored fifty percent of its population. A couple of years ago a woman arrived at our house to do a survey for CABC, paid for by a government grant. We spent a couple of hours talking to her about the organization and that time questioned her about why such a modern, forward thinking, articulate organization would refer to itself by such an archaic, sexist title. At the time she said it was not

Here it is 1983, and you still refer to yourselves collectively as "craftsmen". While some people may feel that belonging to an organization that refers to itself only in the male gender is unimportant, myself, my husband, and many of my colleagues do feel it is very important to the extent that we have refused to join the CABC. The name that collectively represents us is the name we present to the general public. We can't expect the general public to think of us as a group of craftspeople if we don't call ourselves that. It is our duty as independent, "avant-garde" people to do our part to help in the general education of everyone to free up the language.

Why not just drop the "men" part? Call it the "Crafts Association of B.C." I'll bet there are many people already members of this organization who would be much happier with a non-sexist name not to mention all the people who will find it politically possible to become members. name,

It seems like such a little thing, but the ramifications are so great. Surely it can't take that much to change a name. are so great.
