B.C. FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS MAY 15 to 19, 1984
The pace is picking up as the B.C. Festival of the Arts fast approaches. In just over a month, 1500 plus performers, artists, adjudicators, media, and spectators converge in Penticton for the second Festival of the Arts.

The schedule for Festival week has Theatre B.C. competitors on stage and in workshops beginning May 14 to 19 at Pen-Hi Auditorium. The visual arts will be at 500 Railway Avenue, May 13 to 21. At the Community Theatre, May 16 to 19, will be the Association of B.C. Drama Educators. (These are winners from all the B.C. Highschool levels.) The B.C. Association of Performing Arts Festivals will have its competitors running Wednesday to Saturday all over the city.

The Festival Faire will be a colorful outdoor component of the Festival and will take place on the grounds of the Peach Bowl Convention Centre. This includes a Juried Craft Sale, and both stage and "walk-about" entertainment between 11 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Other events being held during the Festival are "Windows by Artists" (downtown beginning May 17), the Penticton Art Gallery Benefit Dinner and Auction at Theo's Restaurant on May 15, and the "Fibre Arts Fantasy and Fashion Show" at Leir House on May 17, 18 and 19.

I would like to bring to the attention of fellow craft-people and anyone selse who is self-employed, that they have a right to coverage by the Worker's Compensation Board in the case of work related injuries. It is called "Opticial Protection" and cost less a year than the price of an average dinner for two with a good wine. Not only will such protection replace lost income in the case of injury, but will also provide treatment and therapy. I urge you to call or write your nearest WCB office for information. The amount of your premium will depnd on how much monthly coverage you want, up to \$2.180. Even if you think your work is not dangerous, the WCB will cover you if you are injured in a car accident on the way to bank your hard-earned money. Or whenever you are engaged in income-earning activities such as delivering good, picking up supplies etc. Find out for yourself soon.



ATLIN CENTRE FOR THE ARTS

Atlin, the northernmost community in British Columbia, is home for a new Centre of the Arts. An intense five week program for 20 experienced artists and craftspeople will be given there this summer, from July 23 to August 24.

This is not a skills development course, but an opportunity to strengthen design concepts, find new ideas, and re-evaluate goals and directions. Participants will gain a stronger base for individual achievements, heightening their design sense and visual awareness. Individuals who show maturity and strong self-motivation in their work will benefit most.

The stimulus comes partly through nature. Genot Dick, founder of the school, travelled 4000 miles in search of the ideal site before he found Atlin. The climate, the mountains with their glaciers and rivers and lakes, the wildlife and the people who have chosen to live there, all provide a valuable contrast to the urban style of life and art. Much of Never Cry Wolf was shot near Atlin. John Faulkner, a Whitehorse pilot and lawyer, says "a majority of the people who live there do so simply to cherish the obvious". A Buddhist local affirms "the dragon paths of energy run closer to the surface in Atlin". And Dick sums it up: "There, life offers a clearer definition of one's being."

Applicants should be prepared to leave their usual tools behind, to "abandon known skills, habits and familiar materials, and discover new solutions by inviting new thoughts and concepts". Potters, for instance, would be pit-firing the local clay. Hilka Florence, well-known in Europe as a ceramic artist and teacher, will give a three-day workshop.

Gernot Dick has exhibited regularly since 1964, and has won several awards. From 1974 on, he has been Master of the Design Studio, School of Crafts and Design, at Sheridan College. He works in photography, oils, watercolor and graphite. Dick has spent his summers since 1979 developing the Atlin site.

I thank you humbly for your continued thoughts. If you feel that my recommendations as to mounting your Warhol (see February issue) are too expensive... I do sympathize. Preservation of Warhol posters is not uppermost in our minds these days when eating, drinking and paying the rent sap our meagre resources. (Please donate to the Vice Bank.)

If, however, you remain Steadfast in Your Desire to Preserve your Signed Work, let's rediscuss this whole thing from a Bargain Basement Preservation Perspective.

Basically, dearie, you know you have to give physical protection to the poster and have neutral, stable materials in contact with it. You can do the first by framing it (metal cut to size), and the latter (literary touch) by backing it with anything from acid-free matboard to masonite sealed with acrylic to a sheet of mylar covering anything.

As for light, since the very uniqueness of your goodie depends on W's signature, you have no choice but to pay attention to light levels. Many inks and markers fade. If you light source is daylight or fluorescent, then UV is an additional problem.

Back to Physical Protection: since you need glazing, it may not be too much more expensive to get UV filtering plexi cut to size (at e.g. Cadillac Plastics and others). Ideally the poster should be separated from the glas/s, or it may stick. With a large poster, however, you may want the flatness direct contact with the glas/s will give, but don't say I didn't warn you.

So it's not bargain basement. But it's a deal! Your Auntie



CONTEMPORARY BASKETS craft AND ART

Basketry is the oldest of the fibre arts and predates the making of ceramics in many parts of the world. Initially baskets served a purely untilitarian purpose, being used for the collection and storage of food and belongings. But there are few cultures which have not experimented with decorative forms of basketry, which in many instances approached the level of art through sheer creative virtuosity and technical skill in the manipulation of the materand design elements.

There are two facets to the making of baskets. Firstly, in order to produce good functional baskets the basket weaver must possess a high of technical skill or craft, which is often achieved only after years of practice. Secondly, through creative exploration of the design elements and form of the basket an artist, who chooses to work in the medium of basketry may produce works of art. This exhibit is concerned with the work of five contemporary Vancouver artists who create art in the baskets. craft,

using techniques developed by the Native people of the Southwestern United States. The bark is first stripped while the willow is still green. Then the willow is split into three and these strands are worked painstakingly, to fine them down to an even thinness. It may take as much as six months to prepare enough willow to make one basket, and another the south state of the strength of the streng six months to make it. Susan Parker works with split cat tails and raffia. The cattails form the foundation coil over which the raffia is stitched. The work is very fine and slow. The large basket took approximately 450 hours to make. For Susan the creative process is closely related to poetry. Examples are given of the poems which relate to each basket.

Pat Prince works with pine needles and raffia, as well as a variety of decorative materials such as feathers and suede strips. On several of the baskets the bundles of pine needles are still attached to their stem and this has been left as a decorative, textural element.
