

It is important to take time thinking about the likely recipients of the gifts. They may well not be collectors, but they will respond to good craftsmanship and good design. EXPO officials want these presentations to end up on display, perhaps in an office or workplace, reminder of a special occasion; they can be purely decorative, or elegantly functional. PEGGY SCHOFIELD, textile artist and administrator, trained originally as a pianist. She was born in San Francisco, and after receiving her B.M. and M.M. at the Eastman School of Music and University of Southern California respectively, she attended Stanford University, where she met her Canadian husband, Wilf. Now a Canadian, Peggy began life as

a craftsman/administrator in 1970 when she became one of the founders of the Craftsmen's Association of British Columbia and edited its first issues of "Craft Contacts". At the same time, she became the founding president of the Vancouver Guild of Fabric Arts.

Her love affair with textiles has continued from a desire for self-expression in the medium through a period of examination of design principles which resulted in a handbook and workshops for budding textile artists.

During her husband's sabbatical leave in 1973 in Japan, she picked up a crafts vocabulary in the language which enabled her to return to that country several times to collect folk textiles and to lead a crafts tour from Okinawa to Tokyo. Much of her collection is housed in U.B.C.'s Museum of Anthropology.

Recently intrigued with the colours possible in fabric printing, she has steered away from machine stitchery and an emphasis on fine art to more mundane things such as men's neckties and placemats, hoping to bring an artistic sensibility to everyday textiles.

Peggy has served as president of the Craftsmen's (It was so-named.) Association of B.C. and on the education committee, and is now a part-time watchdog of the resource centre. Most of her time at the present is spent on an up-coming film for the Association, hoping that bringing the crafts to a performance medium will show the world what it's all about.

Currently, Peggy is acting as exhibitions chairman for the fabric arts guild and as the provincial representative for the Surface Design Association, a U.S.-based printing and dyeing organization. She has recently put together a handbook for fabric printers on business tips and local suppliers.

Peggy was recently given Honourary membership in the Canadian Crafts Council in response to a nomination from the CABC. Her dedication and enthusiasm for crafts has been felt by many.

### SUMMARY OF INFORMATION FROM THE "DIRECTORY" QUESTIONNAIRE

In response to a request from the annual general meeting in Nelson this past June, for a comprehensive summary of the questionnaires sent out for participation in the Directory, the following is a summary from Mike Ovenell, Project Coordinator, dated November 22, 1983.

### INITIAL SUMMARY OF ILLUSTRATED DIRECTORY APPLICATIONS

1. Introduction
Early in 1983, the funding to produce an illustrated directory of British columbia crafts was secured by means of a grant under the Travel Industry Subsidiary Agreement Plan administered by the British Columbia Ministry of Industry and Small Business Development.

In order to obtain the information to be published, approximately 1500 questionnaires were mailed to the CABC membership and members of the general public who had responded to an advertising program of newspaper and radio notices. In all, a total of 424 craftspersons completed the questionnaire and, of these, 400 were featured in the directory.

All responses were entered in a computer-stored data base and the information relating to the directory was recalled via a report generating program and printed on a Xerox 9700 laser printer in a Times Roman font. This output was used as camera-ready copy, and although not of the standard of typesetting required for a royal wedding invitation, was nevertheless quite adequate for the purposes of a directory. The information was also used to generate a craft statistical report via a social services program, SPSS.

This summary is an initial look at some of the response patterns.

All are craftspersons, either full-time, All are members before the CABC, approximately 80% were members before the directory production commenced. The remainder joined at the standard annual fee of \$25 in order to be included. Craft skills of the respondents range from beginners to winners of the prestigious Bronfman Award. A number of prominent craftspersons are not represented and it is felt that their lack of involvement may have had something to do with the fact that entries in the directory were not juried. At the other end of the spectrum, some craftspersons did not respond to the questionnaire, we were told because of their own feelings that their craft skills were not yet adequately developed. A completely subjective estimate is that about 2000 full-time and part-time producing craftsmen work in British Columbia, so this survey could represent about 20% of this number.

The above relates to primary craft interest. 73 respondents indicated a second craft interest. 20 respondents indicated a third craft interest. Second craft interests tend to be ceramics, fibre arts and toymaking.

### . Where Crafts are Sold

About 45% reported that direct sales to the public from their studio or workshop was their most frequent method of selling.
25% indicated craft fairs and 10% craft stores. The second most frequent reported outlets were more or less equally divided between studio, craft fairs and craft stores.

### Mark-up and Discount Policies

A wide range of markups and discounts was reported. However, the majority answered the question "How much would you receive for \$100 worth of retail craft from the following?"

### 7. One of a Kind Production

Something less than half specialize in one of a kind crafts. Only 6% reported themselves as exclusively production oriented. The remainder do both production and one of a kind.

### Accepting Commissions

Slightly more than half of all respondents occasionally accept commissions. Of the remainder

rarely or never accept commissions. half work usually on a commission basis and half

### Consignment versus Direct Sales

Of the craftspeople who sell through stores, about one third demand outright purchase in all cases. One third uses the consignment method exclusively while the remainder is prepared to use either method as appropriate.

#### Sales Reach

Approximately half sell their craft exclusively locally. 22% see their market as provincial, 16% national and 15% international.

Full-time, Part-time and Self Support

A little more than half report working at crafts full-time. 39% consider themselves part-time and 5% responded that they were hobbyists. Of the full-time respondents, about half report supporting themselves with their income. 46% of all respondents indicated that their goal is to one day support themselves with their craft income. The computer has not yet been asked enough questions about these responses but there should be enough information in the data base to gain a more meaningful understanding of the aspirations of craftspeople in this constant. in this regard.

### Portfolio Registry

The CABC maintains a portfolio registry of slides, samples and literature relating to individual craftsmen. This information is made available to architects, designers, retailers etc.
Only 20% of the respondents are represented in this registry although it is open to them as a benefit of membership. The most frequent reasons for nonparticipation were given as:

1. Not aware of existance of registry
2. No suitable photos available

6. Read Craft Contacts and send in information about your own community events where relevant.

7. Put up posters for CABC exhibits and events when you receive them.

8. If at all possible attend at least one Board meeting, maybe the Annual General Meeting. Arts Council funding in your area should be available for this purpose. Plane reservations made a month ahead can cut the cost in half.

10. Ask questions of CABC when you get confused.

11. This list may seem too much, but it's assumed that you will choose certain tasks over others; some are certainly higher priority than others, and that you will delegate the responsibilities as much as possible.

NOTICE FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF CIRCLE CRAFT CO-OP REGARDING MEMBERSHIP DUES.

It has come to our attention that a number of errors have been made involving information given regarding the number of shares that members are required to purchase to attain and maintain membership in Circle Craft Co-op and regarding eligibility for refunds of shares. There has been some misunderstanding of the procedures necessary to alter the rules and confusion regarding exactly what changes may have been carried out in years past. What should have been requests for members to purchase additional shares to assist during periods of financial difficulty were misinterpreted by some to be a requirement It is now clear that an extraordinary resolution voted for by the membership at a general meeting is required to make any such change to the rules of the Co-op. No such resolutions have been passed to date revising the number of shares required or the eligibility for refund. Thus the rules stand as itemized in Schedule 'B' of the previous Co-operative Act. Rule 2 states: No member may hold less than one or more than twenty five shares in the Assoctiation.

Rule 3 states: withdrawal from the Co-op and refund of shares is subject to "the consent of the directors" and they may withhold such refund for a period not exceeding six months

Now that our position is more stable it seems an appropriate time to clarify this issue and it will be raised for discussion at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting. Any proposed changes requiring an extraordinary resolution will be announced in the next newsletter.
