### editorial

As reported in last month's newsletter our application to the Travel Industry Development Subsidiary Agreement (TIDSA) Management Committee was successful. Only a fraction of the requested funds were agreed to but that fraction still amounts to \$32,000. The CABC was one of only three applicants approved under this program which was designed "to assist the travel industry in responding to British Columbia's tourism development potential."

The \$32,000 was allocated for development of an inventory of craftsmen. Your Board and the TIDSA Committee are working to harness the interest and enthusiasm this project is generating within the crafts community to "lever" all manner of improvements in CABC membership benefits and services.

Mike Ovenell, a volunteer who helped put together the TIDSA presentation will soon assume the project management responsibilities of the TIDSA project. In the meantime he has taken on a variety of tasks to familiarize himself with the Association, the first of which was to figure a way to get this newsletter in the mail for not more than 32 cents postage - hence the reduced type size.

We believe the CABC must become more financially self reliant. To do so our most apparent opportunity is through increased membership with particular emphasis on increasing regional membership in the interior. Currently about 59% of our 600 individual members reside in the Lower Mainland, 17% on Vancouver Island and vicinity, 11% in the Kootenays, 4% in the Okanagan and 3% in the Yellowhead Region. The remaining 6% are in other parts of the province (4%) and outsdie B.C. (2%).

Membership fees have historicallycovered roughly only an amount equivalent to the direct cost of producing the newsletter(i.e. only printing and postage, not the staff and volunteer time to prepare it). Almost all other services and costs are paid for from government grants and private donations.

At our current membership rate of \$25 a doubling of membership to 1200 could add another \$15,000 to our revenues while adding less than \$5000 to cover services to those extra 600 members. This would leave \$10,000 for other ongoing servies and, assuming that membership level would be maintained, that \$15,000 would be assured on a continuous basis.

EXPENDITURE OF TIDSA FUNDS
Outline of Projects to be undertaken by CABC by Thelma Ruck Keene.

Thelma Ruck Keene is a member of CABC and of the TIDSA Committee. She is currently a director of Keene Edge Canada, a craft marketing company. She is the author of "Introducing Craftsmen" a catalogue designed to assist diplomatic representatives abroad in the purchase of Canadian crafts for official and personal gifts.

CABC might well call the TIDSA funds a kiss of life. It is confidently expected that the projects made possible with this money will infuse the craftsmen of B.C. and the organization which represents them with a new spirit of purpose and identity.

Essentially crafts need to be touched, handled, used. When this is impossible, to be seen is a good second-best. It is for this reason that the following proposals rely throughout upon visual communication.

## 1. THE DIRECTORY: CRAFTSMEN OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

The first step is to produce an illustrated directory of all CABC members. This will contain a photograph of one item submitted by each craftsman as representative of their work, and a brief biography, i.e. name, location, training, techniques (the formula for this has not yet been determined). The information will be categorized under craft disciplines, i.e. ceramics, leather, wood etc. together with a separate listing to cross-reference names by regions.

The Directory is a working document, designed to be the basic reference on craftsmen in B.C. Although limited to CABC members, it is expected that the Directory's scope and presentation will attract a much larger membership than exists at present. Every member will receive a copy: one of its most important purposes will be to introduce craftsmen working in similar disciplines to one another, and to alert members to potential colleagues in every region. Furthermore, it will be useful to architects and interior designers looking for products of a particular kind, for retailers searching for new craftsmen to market, and will provide a lively guide to the range of crafts in B.C. for government, libraries and the press.

In order to ensure a professional presentation, crafts will be submitted for photographing to the CABC in Vancouver. Every item will be photographed in black and white but, in addition, submissions will be juried and the outstanding crafts will be photographed both on slide film and in colour. This will provide CABC with an invaluable collection showing the best work of their members, and the photographs will thus not be confined only to illustrating the Directory, but can be put to a variety of uses.

### THE REGIONAL BROCHURES:

The Directory will be little use to the average tourist-to cumbersome, too much information, too much bother cross-referencing people and disciplines and regions. What is needed is a listing of craftsmen in each region of the province whose work is for sale, either through named stores or from their own studios.

Drawing on the CABC's photograph collection it is proposed to select, by jury, the best work with which to make up a collage of local crafts to illustrate simple but attractive brochures for each region of B.C. The brochures will contain a brief introductory page and a map indicating where stores and studios can be found. Since each year inevitably brings changes, a separate list of craftsmen and stores in the area will be printed and slipped into each brochure. This can be reprinted whenever an update is necessary.

These eye-catching brochures will be invaluable to the traveller, both on arrival in B.C. and to tempt an extension of stay in regions that promise something of interest. Crafts are a perennial tourist attraction, and the opportunity to visit studios where crafts are being made is always popular. By confining the list of craftsmen in these brochures to those who sell professionally, the tourist can be assured of not wasting this time seeking out people whose production is limited and possibly of not very high quality. Some craftsmen do not encourage visitors, but by indicating stores where their work can be purchased, the traveller will, at the same time, be directed to stores offering creditable merchandise. Tourists are frequently disappointed to find that they have missed worthwhile places or people through ignorance.

## 3. INFORMATION FOR PRESS AND GOVERNMENT AGENCIES:

CABC's photograph collection can be used to feed stories about regional craftsmen to local newpapers. The recognition given to such craftsmen will be a source of individual pride and pleasure, as well as enlivening community interest. Moreover, journalists from further afield, if given good photographs and interesting biographies, will no doubt be glad to utilize such material.

The slide collection can be devised by CABC into striking presentations of outstanding work by B.C. craftsmen; this could be useful to tourist and other government agencies. Also, presentations of this kind would be invaluable to circulate amongst regional guilds to stimulate interest in work from other areas as well as bringing attention to the province's best craftsmen.

#### . CONCLUSION:

The most immediate benefit to CABC from the projects just described will be an increase in membership. The evidence of imaginative initiative in the use of the TIDSA money will attract new members; increased funds will facilitate the continuance of the project initially funded through TIDSA and, most importantly, with a larger membership and a workable income, CABC can fulfill its proper function of providing a lively centre of support and activity for the craftsmen of B.C.


## shop gallery
