CABC ANNUAL REPORT 1989-90 PRESIDENT'S REPORT- Brian Baxter

Since one of the most challenging aspects of being President for me has been not to publicly present my personal opinions I would like to take this opportunity on my last official function to express a few.

They may, in fact, not differ from general opinion which might indicate an erosion of my own personality. Anyway.

This past year I feel our greatest achievements have been three-fold; Plus an acquisitional treat.

3. The formation of an Affiliates Forum. The Board decided that we desired an atmosphere of a more involved commitment between craft organizations to joint projects. This Forum has met under semi-informal circumstances which have resulted in such good conversation about the real needs of the affiliate organizations and their members.

The energy level in these three areas has been high, positive and intense - welcome adjectives in our organizations and activities.

Another personal "jolly" is that this year the CABC finally acquired a handy tool after countless years of thinking about it. I'm talking about the computer. It's good to see this step into the technological world without the fear and superstition of the past and the recognition of exactly what it is - a tool.

A few comments (in fact, again three-fold) on what I see, as outgoing President, to be the immediate needs of the future. Ron David may wish I end my report now. But again I think my concerns will probably be fairly obvious (what's happening to any eccentricities I had?)

1. We need to take our guide (the Framework Policy) and draw up some tour routes - that is, do some planning. We need to priorize, explore these tour routes and just see exactly what we can accomplish in our future trip. Planning is what I am talking about. Organizing our future under our Framework Policy - the Board must address this in the future.

2. Filling the ranks. The success of a strong organization comes from community involvement at the Board and committee level. Our skeletal structure needs meat. We need to train volunteers for ultimate satisfaction in being involved in projects. The Personnel committee needs a chairperson. We have vacancies in the committee structure and need volunteers to develop and implement the various tours the CABC wishes to take.

3. A major change in the not-to-distant future will come in the staff. A search committee will be struck from the Board to look for a new Executive Director - since our dear Gail is packing her bags for an extended European tour. And besides making rendezvous plans with her the Board must make plans to deal with her loss. I've given away some of Gail's news! Reprinted from the September 15,1990 Globe and Mail CRAFTS SUFFER FROM CLONING

Browsing in craft shops is one of life's low-key pleasures, one we tend to indulge in more when we're on holiday than during the barely-controlled panic of our daily working lives. There is something friendly and unthreatening about a well-run craft shop, as opposed to the intimidating atmosphere of many art galleries, and there's always the possibility of finding some surprising treasure at a cost you can afford.

Ideally, craft shops provide small glimpses into local culture because that is what crafts are: practical or decorative objects, made from locally available materials, that somehow reflect the needs and desires of the mythologies and esthetics of indigenous communities.

Why then, on a recent vacation in eastern Canada and the United States, did I find myself looking at the same crafts, the same shapes, materials, colors and fabrics, the same tired visual ideas, everywhere I went? Two weeks on Prince Edward Island gave me ample opportunity to browse, but only one shop out of the dozens I popped into - Gaudreau's Fine Woodworking of New Glasgow - Conveyed that satisfying sense of individual

crafts-people working within but also enhancing their artistic and geographic traditions.

Most of what I saw you'd recognize from your own local craft shops, wherever in Canada you live: Tie-dyed shirts and batik scarves, woven placemats and table runners in neutral colors, earthy jugs and mugs that look like sixties warm-overs, quitted everything from pot-holders to vests to bedcovers but very little real quilting or indigenous designs, silver and enamel jewelry that has long lost its novelty. Even the smell of these shops is identical, as they all sell the same blends of potpourri.

What was discouraging was not just seeing all the same products on sale all over Prince Edward Island, but that they repeated themselves in the craft shops I visited in Quebec, New Brunswick, Halifax and the New England states. What was puzzling was that these were not made-in-Taiwan machine reproductions of local North American crafts; they were all being produced by local craftspeople in different areas but all repeated the same designs and styles.

"Ah, you've discovered what we in the trade call Kodak-itis," said Peter Weinrich, Executive Director of the Canadian Crafts Council, when I asked him to explain this cloning phenomenon. "It used to be, of course, that individual crafts related very strongly to their own parts of the country or the world. But now craftspeople in Canada buy these glossy crafts magazines published internationally and are copying styles and techniques and whole craft forms from far-flung countries. Designs travel very fast these days." Batik, for example, was a craft virtually exclusive to southeast Asia until a couple of decades ago; tiedyeing was African and unknown in North America until the sixtles.

Traditional designs are impossible to copyright, as the Kowichan Indians on Canada's West Coast discovered when Japanese manufacturer's began reproducing their famous blackand-white sweater patterns. Designs by individual artists in Canada only have copyright protection for one-of-a-kind objects and multiples of up to 50 copies. If an artist wants to produce and protect - more than that from his original design, he must file under the Industrial Design Act for \$250 plus lawyers' fees. Few artists do. As glass-blower Denise Belanger-Taylor wrote in a recent article in Ontario Craft, "No one knows, until quite a few of an item have been sold, if it is going to be a success. Who can afford \$250 plus for every new design they want to try out?"

So designs are stolen, ripped off, slightly altered, duplicated from photos. It all leads to the watering-down process that was so apparent in those craft stores I visited this summer. We have come to accept the inevitable sameness of mainstream consumer shopping in North American department stores and malls. We've even come to accept it in tourist shops where the same lobster-claw ashtrays can be found near every beach in the world, and the T-shirt manufacturers simply change Toronto to Tuscaloosa to Torquay after the words "I love." It just seemed so unlikely - and so distressing - that it would happen to the craft shops.

Initially, when I read through Ms Drainie's article, I questioned whether it expressed an informed opinion. With my back up slightly, I thought, "she obviously hasn't been around here." But then I had to admit her ideas were gained from experience- an experience even Peter Weinrich agrees is a reality.

It is unfortunate that money can supersede integrity in the scope of creation. But there will always be those who are capable with their hands, but less able, perhaps because of the financial risk involved, with their imaginations. In this respect, the tie-dyed t-shirts don't bother me. What would the cool teenagers wear after all?

What is dire, however, is how the title "craft" is overused; how a "craft store" can be everything from a low grade souvenir shop to Crafthouse.


I wish people in positions to educate would recognize these extreme differences that exist, qualify production work as production work and allow "craft" to mean made with mind and body alike. For as Kodakitis is a reality, so too is artful craft.

Crafthouse

Did you know that puffer fish expand to twice their normal size?

Morna Tudor certainly does. In fact, the glass artist is more than aware of most sea creatures, for she is inspired by that realm of nature.

"I am at my happiest knee deep in water discovering new life forms like the Daisy Brittlestar entwined within the mass of a kelo holdfast."

Her love is vividly illustrated in her photographs, collages of nature, that only a sensitive eye could recognize. This sensitivity is also reflected in Tudor's sand castings of trout skeletons and crab claws, suggesting fossils frozen in time.

The shell forms, "... colours of purple sea stars, pink fan worms, seaweed greeen, and chiton blue," are elegant and balance the humourous wide-eyed stare of the puffer fish with their silicone spikes. As spirited as the theme of the exhibition is the use of materials: wood, steel, stone, granite, pearl, cord, silicone, and glass.

MADE BY HAND 1990

September 13th marked the opening of Made by Hand: Felt and Paper, the province wide juried exhibition organized by the CABC and the Canadian Craft Museum (formerly Cartwright Gallery). The two groups worked together to produce an exhibition demonstrating the excellence of BC craft. But such is typically the case with Made by Hand. What was different this year and very successful was the focus the exhibition took on two media.

The decision to base **Made by Hand** on felt and paper, rather than all media, as was the case in the past, was made for several reasons. "It was felt," explained **Gail Rogers**, CABC Executive Director, "that a survey exhibition was not as relevant as it once was, now that there are more exhibition opportunities for craftspeople. As well, we thought a theme or media specific exhibition would make for a more interesting and/or focused exhibition."

Why paper and felt? "Because recently there has been alot of work done in these areas, particularly paper. Among other things and people, kakali hmp has inspired many craftspeople to explore paper."

The "kakali hmp" to which Gail refers is the paper workshop/studio space on Granville Island, where artists do everything from "pull sheets" to make vacuum cast embossments, founded by artist and teacher Sharyn Yuen. In the past seven years that Sharyn has exulted paper in Vancouver, she has worked with eight of the sixteen artists exhibiting in Made by Hand. When asked about her feelings on the exhibition, Sharyn commented on how pleased she was to see paper reach this level or recognition, having such an extensive exhibition in a prominent gallery such as the Canadian

Craft Museum.

Little has been said about the felt pieces in the show. Only 3 of the 25 works are of that medium. Yet these pieces were some of the strongest in the show. One only wishes the \$10,000 in purchase awards, generously provided by Coast Paper Ltd., were not exclusively granted to works in paper.

For the first time since its inception in 1974, **Made by Hand** will be going on tour. So in more ways than one this exhibition marks change


