EDITORIAL: President, Walter Dexter has recently returned from World Craft Council in Mexico, and herewith is his interesting and provocative account.

> - Craftshows-Demonstrations - "It is hard to evaluate the ultimate value of a World Craft Conference but probably the most positive aspects are those of seeing peoples pursue their particular skills and of mixing with craftsmen from all over the world. At this conference we were, primarily, exposed to a rich demonstration by individuals demonstrating the crafts of jewellery making, weaving, pottery, furniture making, glass blowing and stone cutting. Mexicans were dominant in these demonstrations but others from over the world, for example, Bill Reid from Canada, were also displaying their individual skills.

> One of the interesting facts to emerge was that in many cases these people were able to produce high quality and beautiful objects using a minimum amount of equipment. For example, a Nigerian jeweller working in silver was squatting on the ground over a tiny fire, using hand bellows and a minute crucible utilizing the lost wax process. He made his molds with clay and dung and then propped them in the ashes while he poured his silver into them. Finally, he cleaned his silver with lime juice. I was told by another jeweller that if lime juice were unavailable the same result could be achieved with the use of urine. Similarly, much of the weaving was produced on the simplest of back-strap and other primitive looms.

> I was also particularly interested in the black pottery makers from Mexico. These were apprentices of the famous Dona Rosa, held in as high esteem by the Mexicans as are their "Living National Treasures", such as Hamada, by the Japanese. The black potters had built their own kiln and near the end of the week fired their ware. They were young potters and were very concerned lest their pots emerge red, instead of the traditional black, as in that case they felt they would be mortified before the whole conference. Many other potters were demonstrating at the conference, including three well known Americans: Rhodes, Volkas and Gronborg.

> Another man who was generating a great deal of excitement was the Australian Peter Travis, an excellent potter. However, most of the interest in this case centred round his kite designs. Peter Travis builds kites out of sail canvas; some of them are twenty feet and more across with tails forty feet long. We are negotiating with Peter for a workshop in kite building in Vancouver next year.

Another area in which particular energy lay was glass blowing. The glass blowers were perhaps the best organized and most enthusiastic craftsmen at the conference. Through the excitement engendered there they decided to form an international organization primarily to promote an exchange of ideas. I would especially like to see some development in this Province in glass blowing as, at the moment, virtually no work is being done in this area.

I feel that I have neglected reporting on the weavers at the conference. I have done so, not because there was not much activity in this field, but because I know very little about it. In fact, there was a great deal of interest. Looms of every size and type were set up, and visitors were literally buying the spectacular Mexican blankets and other woven goods before the warps were cut."

Thoughts about future organization - "As your President, I did make valuable contacts with craftsmen and craft organizers, particularly from Eastern Canada. These contacts will help, I hope, in establishing more positive relationships, especially with the Canadian Crafts Council. It seems ironic that one has to go to Mexico to talk business with one's own countrymen, but since our own country is so vast this is what tends to occur!"

These have been the positive aspects of this Conference. There are negative ones. During my first two or three days in Oaxtepec I was, frankly, bored. First of all, not being an official delegate, I was not involved in the meetings that were going on with regard to the politics of world craft, so I had plenty of time to take part in the regular curriculum of seminars, slide shows, movies, and demonstrations. However, as a professional craftsman of twenty years standing, I found that most of these events, (outside the Mexican demonstrations themselves) were aimed at the elementary or possibly intermediate level craftsmen and were what one could expect to find at any local guest instructor work-shop. Perhaps this is at it should be, but I did note that most of the professional craftsmen who were there had been officially invited and would probably not have been there had they not been fulfilling an official role. This means that many of those attending the conference were not really involved craftsmen. However, it was announced that at the next conference, to be held in two years in Japan, an attempt will be made to ensure that only professional craftsmen and administrators will be involved. This is a difficult problem, for how does one make the distinction between the enthusiastic amateur and the professional? It is hoped some method may be devised whereby active weavers, active potters and so on, may reach each other as did the glass blowers at this conference. If this problem could be met I feel that future conferences would be of greater value than the past meetings."
