NEW ZEALAND OKS CRAFT TEACHER CERTIFICATE

The Authority for Advanced Vocational Awards (AAVA) in Christchurch, New Zealand has validated a national certificate for craft teachers, the Intermediate National Certificate in Craft Teaching. Holding this certificate is expected to give craft teachers greater power in negotiating for teaching jobs, says the Crafts Council of New Zealand.

The three requirements for gaining the certificate are 1) a recognized competency in crafts, 2) completion of three papers on adult education, and 3) passing a curriculum in teaching methods, design, materials technology and marketing.

The AAVA has invited several teaching institutions to carry the courses necessary to complete the certificate. Details are available from the National Secretary, NZSWWS, Box 51-171, Tawa 6230, or the Education Coordinator, ANZEG, 40a Glandovey Road, Christchurch 5.

NEW CULTURAL CENTRE

A new cultural centre for Richmond is the latest project of the Community Arts Council of Richmond. Preliminary design plans are in place and applications have been made by the Municipality to the governments of B.C. and Canada for capital grants. **Donna Bradshaw** is chairperson of the Coordinating/Advisory Fundraising group, which is charged with raising \$250,000. The group has welcomed both cash donations and the donation of art objects by artists to be sold

through the CAC's Gallery Shop, with proceeds from the latter going to the building fund. It is hoped that work on the new centre will begin at the end of 1990.

Letters

May 18, 1990 Dear Colleague,

Over the past several months Canadians have seen the mood of our country turn increasingly bitter and desperate. The increased linguistic and ethnic intolerance, and the widespread rhetoric which infers that the break-up of Canada is an inevitability, are examples of disrespect for what we have achieved together as a country.

The Canadian Conference of the Arts has received expressions of concern from Canadian artists in all parts of our country about this situation. Mary Pratt and Pam Hall, visual artists from Newfoundland, and Rene Blouin, a gallery owner from Montreal, among others, have suggested that the time has come for artists to express their faith in Canada and the cultural heritage which they have helped to craft through their work over the years. The intention of this gesture is not to take sides in the political discussions which are under way at the moment, but rather to give expression to the fundamental commitment to Canada which surpasses transient political considerations and issues. In other words, we must express our unity as passionately as others express our distinctions.

press our distinctions.

We would like you to think about how this can best be achieved within your own sphere of activity. There is no master program behind this initiative: a letter to the Prime Minister and other politicians, a letter to your own colleagues in other areas of Canada, a letter to the editor of your local or national newspaper — whatever you feel could help to focus on the broader and basic values we as Canadians share in the totality of our cultural expression. Somehow we must give voice to the deep commitment many of us have for Canada and other Canadians. It is this commitment that has sustained us for 123 years, and we cannot allow it to be swept aside by the tides of intolerance and political posturing. We need to reaffirm the need for a more positive climate to direct and encourage responsible leadership.

As an artist you are often asked to write letters or lend your voice in support of some issue central to the cultural life of this country. This appeal is basic and essential. Please consider some appropriate gesture and please do it soon. There has never been more at stake.

This cultural revival, they feel, is attributable to greater wealth and education and interestingly enough, women, who increasingly have both. As well, they feel as a reaction to high tech, "high touch" has evolved. Having been with a computer and fax machine all day, our need to re-examine what it means to be human through the arts has become greater. Even personal fitness programs have had an effect, causing people to be less interested in spectator sports, and more able to engage in the arts.

Apparently too, the renaissance will not be confined to the traditional art centers. The world's biggest museum of art, 500,000 square feet, will be in North Adams, Massachusetts. The state of Massachusetts voted a \$35 million bond issue for Mass MOCA, and \$15 million must still be raised. "So widespread is the arts boom that business and job opportunities in artistic fields are expanding dramatically – from arts telemarketing to corporate art consulting."

Such predictions are very easy to take. They make us feel all warm inside – at least, until we think of cuts in federal arts spending, GST's, and all the other things that make it hard to imagine the artist in the lap of luxury. Patricia & John want to assure us, however, that such impediments will have a paradoxical strengthening effect, "pressing corporations into service and forcing arts organizations to become more sophisticated about marketing and generating new revenue sources." Perhaps this is the vision we must picture in our minds and work towards.

'WEARABLE SCULPTURE' IN GERMAN JEWELLERY EXHIBITION AT CARTWRIGHT

Jewellery today in Germany is a form of sculptural expression, not just personal adomment. An internationally-travelling exhibition, *Contemporary German Jewellery*, proves that point at the Cartwright Gallery/Canadian Craft Museum in Vancouver from June 1 through September 3, 1990. The exhibition includes sculptural brooches, necklaces, rings, bracelets and earrings by 24 leading jewellery artists from the Federal Republic of Germany, and has been brought to Vancouver by the Goethe Institut.

A day-long seminar on June 1, to be held at Emily Carr College of Art and Design, will challenge the public with new attitudes of jewellery as wearable sculpture. Dr. Fritz Falk, Director of Germany's international jewellery museum, the Schmuckmuseum Pforzheim, will discuss objects in the schmuckmuseum Pforzheim, will discuss objects in the exhibition in the context of the history of jewellery and the international scope of jewellery today. Practicing jewellers from western Canada and Washington will discuss the "new jewellery" and its acceptance as jewellery and as sculpture. The seminar has been planned with the Crafts Association of British Columbia, the Jewellery Art and Design Program of Vancouver Community College, and Emily Carr College of Art and Design.

CONTEMPORARY GERMAN JEWELLERY includes provocative works by internationally respected artists Otti Kunzli, Manfred Bischoff, Georg Dobler, Hermann Junger and others whose names have become synonymous with unorthodox wearable sculpture. An illustrated catalogue of the exhibition published by the exhibition sponsor, The Institute for Foreign Cultural Relations, Stuttgart, will be available at the Gallery.
