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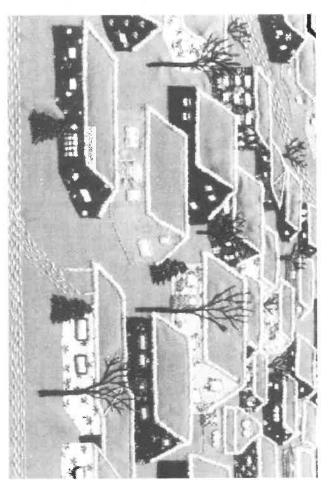
# BETTINA'S FIBRE ARTS

ettina Maylone received a Fine Arts Diploma from Camosun College in 1978. Among her sources of inspiration, Bettina includes people, memories, emotion, and a sense of place. She looks to her family: her children's boundless creativity and energy; her parents' adaptiveness and inventiveness, whether it be her mother's own knitting patterns or the boat which her father built to live on; her husband's film work, drawing, sculpting, and the 'bizarre projects' he makes with their children.

Working in a small studio at home and spending much time with her children, Maylone recently incorporated paint and ink in some pieces, then used

them to dye the fabric and provide changes in texture. Three of her pieces are included in the Crafts Association of BC's "Made By Hand" exhibit touring Canada.

"I approach each piece as something I want to tell and the fabrics/ threads are the words. There is the precision of embroidery thread, the infinite texture of silks, wools, and novelty threads. It seems every thread or fabric reminds me of something. I collect them like looking for just the right word in the dictionary. I see my work as being related to drawing and painting except to me, fibre is infinitely tastier than paint."

Much informal networking occurred and as a result several projects are underway that could be of benefit to BC's craft community:

 The four western provinces are currently planning an exhibition of

- ceramics for the National Conference on Education in the Ceramic Arts (NCECA) to be held next March in Minneapolis. Our participation is, of course, contingent on receiving funding for this project. Grant applications have been submitted and initial responses from the funders have been positive.
- 2. Quebec has received a grant from the Department of External Affairs to send an exhibition of work to the Chicago Sculpture, Objects, and Functional Art Exhibition (Oct., '95), on the condition that they try to partner with other provinces. It is unclear at the moment just how that money will trickle down. However, discussions with the provincial craft councils are on-going, and we intend to pursue the opportunity.
- Alberta is currently researching the cost of jointly producing a "craft

calendar" that each province would feed data into. This type of shared publication could provide craftspeople with more information on grants, commissions, craft fairs, education and employment opportunities, etc.

As is the custom, each province gave a slide presentation, which resulted in one of our textile artists, Vivienne Pearson, being invited to teach at Le Centre des Metier Plien Art en Construction Textiles in Montreal. (In an attempt to address the concern that much of CABC's activity only benefits those craftspeople living in Vancouver, please note: only one of the artists whose slides I showed was from Vancouver!)

This was the first time in several years that CABC has been able to send representatives to this meeting, due to financial constraints. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to Circle Craft Co-operative and Canadian Airlines Int'l for their generous donations which made the trip possible.

### ACTIVIST RALSTON DIES

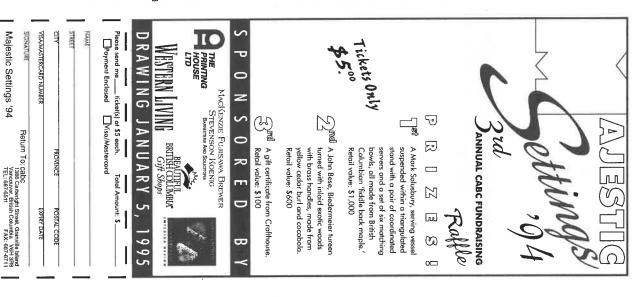

# REAL WORLD BOOTH DESIGN

BY JAN HERSEY—Does booth design really matter? Absolutely! It increases sales! Today's craft artists can't afford to ignore the image they present to show buyers.

Good design does not mean simply a slick presentation, but an effectively

arranged and efficiently constructed display that does the job of drawing people into your booth and engaging them in your work. Your booth should create opportunities for you to become involved with your customer in a positive, non-threatening way.

#### A SALES TOOL

The purpose of your booth is to attract attention to your work. Keep these points in mind.

- Study Other Booths—What gets your attention? Take note of the construction.
- Cost—As with most things, the best doesn't come cheaply. Expect to pay between one and three thousand dollars for your booth. Try to spread the cost out over a couple of years.
- Create A Basic Skeleton—Choose a design that can be updated by redecorating, not rebuilding.
- Reflect Your Customers' Tastes—Study your customers, then choose materials and a style that will attract, intrigue, and comfort them.
- Keep Booth Design Compatible With Your Work—Choose materials that enhance the lines and textures of your craft items. Your booth should complement your crafts, not compete with them.
- Don't Bombard Your Audience—Avoid overcrowding the items in your booth. Give each craft piece some room to breath.

#### Think Functionality

Aim to finish design and construction of your booth before you ever use it, or there may be items you'll never find time to get done. Leave as few details as possible to attend to at setup time so that you have time to relax and rejuvenate yourself before the long hours of a show begin.

Build efficient storage and work spaces into the booth. Allow space for product packing and wrapping, cheque writing, record keeping, follow-up notes, mirrors, and tools for booth and product repair.

If you participate in many shows the size and weight of your booth pieces become very important. How likely is it that you'll have to carry the pieces, how easily can they be erected, and how many people are required to set up? Design for easy portability.

Modular elements can be combined or left home depending on your location at any given show. Construct your booth to fit in aisle and corner spaces. Normal spaces are ten-by-ten foot, eight-by-eight foot, or eight-by-ten foot. For height, eight feet is usually the maximum. You may have to adapt to the show building's structural elements such as overhead pipes and wires.

#### Set The Tone

Simply put, your customers can't buy what they can't see. A good lighting system is worth the investment. Some options include spots, bars, and even table lamps for an intimate feel. A booth that is too dark does not appear to be a public space and may discourage entering.

If you must sit, choose a chair that puts you at eye level with customers.

Tall director's chairs work well. Be aware however, that sitting telegraphs a message that you are bored, that there's not enough business to keep you busy.

With so much competition for their attention and time, you don't want customers to have to work to see what you are selling. Place displays and work surfaces at appropriate heights and distances. Arrange the elements in your booth so as to encourage people to enter. Make it safe for them to easily and comfortably move around. Keep at least four feet between objects such as counters, pedestals, walls, etc. Your customers may be carrying packages, and you don't want them to knock anything over.

Take an idea from your neighbourhood mall: make the opening into your selling space wide. It encourages customers to enter and discourages those inside from feeling claustrophobic and anxious for escape.

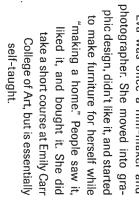

The CABC Portfolio Registry is situated within the Resource Centre. It contains the portfolios of members of CABC, displayed in a format that provides easy access to other professionals. Architects, interior designers, art consultants, fashion designers, retail store owners, government, businesses and corporations, gallery owners, curators, journalists, educators, researchers, and students have access to the portfolios.

The Crafts Association encourages all of its members to be included in the Portfolio Registry. Currently there is no charge for inclusion in the portfolio registry, but the following criteria must be met:

- The applicant must be a member in good standing of the Crafts Association;
- The applicant must agree to pay the Crafts Association 10% fee on any

work commissioned through the registry – this fee goes directly to the maintenance and administration of the registry;

- The applicant must supply the following materials:
- 6 to 8 35mm slides labelled correctly (see below);
- A typed curriculum vitæ, including relevant education, awards, exhibitions, and commissions.
- Any available published material that focuses on you or your crafts.
   All submissions must meet these criteria. The CABC office is pleased to provide guidance in the preparation of effective slides and CVs.

The Registry is updated periodically and submissions may be made at any time. If you already belong to the registry, you should update it periodically to make sure your submission contains current material and is in the current format.
