The show was four days starting on Sunday, July 25th to Wednesday, July 28th. The hours were 10 - 6 pm each day, except for the last which ended at 4 pm. The first day was the busiest with sales reaching \$5,000, our half way goal. The second day brought in \$3,000, the third day \$2,500 and the last day \$1,500 (figures are approximate). Traditionally the first day is the best day. Jo Darts and I worked the booth and this was manageable with the level of activity, although a larger space would have been more comfortable. After a short while, we adopted a system where we could assist one another with the writing of orders, capturing information and handing out information on craftspeople and the CABC. We arrived Friday evening only to discover our booth, which we had directed all our potential clients to (#953), had been sold to another exhibitor. Three hours later and much running around a new booth was assigned (#939), draped, carpeted and the power installed. At 10pm on Friday we commenced the set up (set up was 12 hours over two days, take down was 6 hours). for general purposes and not just the gift show, a stamp was made stating, "Visit us at the Toronto Gift show, July 25 - 28, Booth #953". This card proved to be a very valuable tool as several clients indicated they had received the card and visited us as a result. The Show participating artists. In order to use the card

he work of fourteen craftspeople was represented at the Toronto Gift Show this July 25 - 28, an initiative to introduce some of our members to new markets, supported by the BC Arts Council. The response to the selection of BC crafts presented was extremely positive and overall we exceeded our expectations. This article provides an overview of the Toronto Gift Show experience and some tips for those considering participating in the next show with the CABC or on their own.

Despite this show being one on the poorest shows in many years, overall we did very well and have justified this initiative. The CABC booth was creative and distinctive, attracting much attention, compliments and orders. There is an active market for handmade craft work from BC in the Ontario market and this is a very good channel for it.

Goals

- 1. To generate \$10,000 in wholesale revenue and collect leads
- 2. To promote BC craft and the CABC3. To collect information on the trade show
- 24 CABC promotional packages (Made by Hand catalogue, rack card, press release, Vancouver Sun article on Crafthouse and business cards) and information sheets on the participating craftspeople were handed out to all buyers and leads. 250 Galleries and Shops received the CABC promotional card prior to

Results

Through our own research, discussions with several exhibitors and buyers and the experience itself we learned much about the

Ontario market, other shows and markets, buying characteristics, craft work being produced by others, display, trade show protocol, shipping, and potential clients.

Preparation

Initially we had planned to rent all the display fixtures but as we spoke to artists and other experienced participants, we realized a larger impact would be made by designing our own booth. A meeting was held with a few member craftspeople to discuss ideas about display and identify existing models. Several people from the crafts community were also consulted. After much deliberation, light weight plywood plinths were designed and built by a contact from within our membership. The plinths were built so they would nest inside each other to save on space for shipping and storage. Sixteen 4', 3', and 2' plinths with an 18" x 18" surface (give or take a few inches for nesting) were created and stained off-white to display the objects. Two jewellery cases were constructed, modelled after an existing design and altered slightly. Several panels of naturally dyed charcoal cotton curtains were created by a member textile artist to place over the standard booth textile artist to place over the standard booth drapery. Clamp lamps were purchased from Home Depot for a simple lighting system and holding everything together were many extension cords, zap straps, and tape! We were able to display all the work in an elegant and spacious manner.

A rack card (4" x 9") was designed and printed to promote the CABC and BC craft. Five images of craft work we were featuring at the show (photographs supplied by the craftspeople) were used for the design. A post card format was adopted and 250 cards were mailed out to galleries and shops in Ontario prior to the show. A mailing list was compiled using the Ontario Crafts Council's "Guide to Galleries and Shops in Ontario" and "Ontario Craft" and client lists from the

Specific Feedback

- 12 of the 14 participants received orders; (one craftsperson's shipment did not arrive)
- Average total orders received by an artist was \$923 (including the artist who received \$0 in orders). Average total for those who received orders was \$1,000 (excluding the artist who received \$0 in orders).
- Average number of buyers per participant 3.5
- Average order placed by a buyer was \$280
- Minimum order of \$100 \$150 is standard, minimum quantities are not favoured
- Buyers like to avoid COD charges and prefer to be called ahead with the total amount and then forward a cheque (pro
- Major galleries and shops have their credit information ready and request net 30 Most buyers are open to any shipping carrier and delivery of 4 - 6 weeks is standard
- Our target buyers come to the show specifically to see the "Uniquely Ontario" component for new work. They visit booths in the neighbouring "Graduate" section and the "Featuring Canadian", where the CABC was located. Being closer to the "Graduate" section is more advantageous.
- While buyers didn't request exclusivity, they did discourage us selling to other venues in their direct vicinity this was nev

Jewellery; we had three jewellers and one glass artist working with glass bead earrings and bracelets. High-end jewellery did not receive as much activity as jewellery under \$60 wholesale. \$12 beaded earrings and some jewellery in the 30 - 55 range did well. Total sales \$2,266.

Wood; there was positive feedback and enthusiasm for our wood selection. A couple of Corporate Gift companies as well as galleries and shops were interested. Total sales \$2,587.

Glass; there was huge interest in our glass selection and many orders were placed. Although we were hesitant to feature high end items, 5 ray gunz by Jeff Burnette wholesaling for \$150 were ordered at the show. Glass sales \$2,858, glass beaded show. Glass sal jewellery \$307.

Textiles; we had one artist working with hand-painted silk scarves who received one large order for her work. These pieces were wall pieces and wearable. The wholesale prices were \$75 - \$150. Many were attracted to these pieces. Total sales \$600.

Other; cards (total sales \$2,014), metal ornaments (total sales \$865), mixed media vases, picture holders and clocks (total sales \$337), soap (total sales \$167).

This show was originally scheduled to take place in September, but in order to compete with the Canadian Gift and Tableware show (CGTA) which takes place in mid-August, the producers of the Toronto Gift show, Southex, changed the dates to the end of July. As a result of this sudden date change and other issues, the show was drastically smaller and attendance was much lower. Even though it was only 2 weeks before the CGTA, it seemed early to be thinking about holiday buying and the summer season was coming to a close. Two clients placed orders for the summer of 2000! All exhibitors who had participated in this show before confirmed that it was a poor show.

Despite this poor climate, however, we did very well and made a good impression on the buyers. Because we received such positive feedback with respect to the work, our overall display and who we were, we feel there is great potential in the Ontario market for high quality hand-made BC craft. Buyers were very happy to view a selection of new products. Everyone buyer we asked felt that the Toronto Gift Show was a better venue for the type of work we represented rather than the CGTA, the major competitor as this time.

Executive Director's Message Cherryl MASTERS



MADE IN CANADA -Granville Island A Craft Crawl on

Made in Canada - a craft crawl on Granville Island was the second tour organized by the CABC within the 20th anniversary year-long celebrations for Granville Island. 10 stops on the tour brought you into direct contact with craftspeople, craftwork and demonstrations. On exhibit at Crafthouse were turned wood objects by Neno Catania, who also demonstrated wood turning on his lathe in front of Ocean Art Works. Lenka Suchanek created intricate bobbin lace patterns with copper wire as she chatted with visitors at Crafthouse. Other activities included an outdoor indigo dying demonstration by Jean Kares, glass blowing at David NewSmall's, wheel throwing with Daniel Materna, tapestry weaving by Ruth Jones, a visit to master goldsmith Per Madsen's studio, artists at work at the Kingsmill Pottery studio, weaving at Diana Sanderson's, and an exhibition of Gordon Hutchens' ceramic work at the Gallery of BC Ceramics. This event was a wonderful opportunity to present the diversity of craft to a massive audience as there were thousands of people on Granville Island enjoying the many festivities of Canada Day.

Many many thanks to Neno Catania who took time out of his very busy schedule to demonstrate for the entire day. Neno designed a stand specifically to transport his lathe for the event. MEMBERS VISA MERCHANT DISCOUNT

A few members have commented on some issues in obtaining the Members Visa Merchant discount. In July, Cherryl Masters met with a Scotiabank representative to communicate these issues and to receive an update on procedures for application.

Some basic information which the Bank requires when you are making an application is your annual revenue. To support this you will need a business plan (particularly if you are starting out) and financial statements. You will also be required to have a business certificate issued by the Province of BC. They will also make a site visit to the premises where you operate. If you do not have a business plan or any idea as to how to write one, Scotiabank has created a tool to assist you called, Scotiabusiness Plan Writer. This is available through their website at www.scotiabank.ca. This business plan format is one which is geared to the needs of bank. The Bank Manager will ask you questions about the nature of your business including how you sell your work. Be aware that if you say you are taking orders over the phone, you enter into a higher risk category and will be required to provide additional information such as audited financial statements. This is because no signature is secured through orders by phone and there is more potential for fraud.

If you have financial information on your business and present yourself in an organized and professional manner, you should have no problem accessing this benefit. Every branch is different and some may not be up to speed on this arrangement or the procedures. If you run into any difficulties, please contact us and we will call a representative to investigate and try to assist in the matter.

Scotiabank has just infroduced a new option which could be ideal for craftspeople. It is called IVR (Interactive Voice Response). You do not require a terminal and as such, there is no terminal charge. You just need access to a phone. You simply call the ScotiaMerchant IVR number and key in your access code, enter the requested information (transaction type, credit card number, expiry date, date of sale and amount), once the transaction is confirmed an authorization number is given which you record on your imprinted sales draft. The transaction is automatically deposited into your account and you do not have to submit any paper transaction slips to your bank. This option only allows for credit card transactions, not interac direct payment. Call your bank to inquire about this new option.
