country tour which takes place every other year was set up by the National Gallery to honor Norah McCullough on her retirement in 1969. It had to be a personal selection and obviously every craftsman in Canada couldn't be included. Even so, I do think I managed to integrate a representative cross section

I was very pleased to show what I did. The quality of slides was professional and to my delight went together very well. In fact I was often asked how I had managed to take so many of these slides myself! Craftsmen are increasingly conscious of the imperson at work and seven slides of objects they had made. I received many favorable comments on being able to see the person at work and am glad I used that approach. Altogether I showed 320 slides and tried to include at least 2-4 on each craftsman. Being a dual image projection this allowed me to cover much ground in the 1½ hour presentation.

I was eager to include the NWT where I had taught for seven years.
