





THE MOUSE: chubby with good meat, a tail which can be pounced on and big ears to give its position away is the perfect prey for the perfect predator, THE CAT: flexible, fast, able to leap long distances and pounce on its prey with razor sharp retractable claws and powerful teeth. But what if a new element is thrown into this element of the food chain? A method of defense that changes everything? Imagine if a skilled metalsmith built a suit of armour, the defensive covering worn in fighting, to fit the tiny mouse? Anatomically correct and authentic in every detail, including articulated steel body plates, helmets, tilting visors with hinge pins, rivets and lances, the miniature armour changes the cat and mouse



game forever. The soft, tasty little prey is now a formidable metal opponent which can strike back with its tiny, but sharp, lance! There is only one solution to restore the balance: the cats must find their own armourer. But who can the cats turn to? To the man who supplied the mice with their armoured ware-Calgary metalsmith Jeff de Boer.


de Boer has combined his passion for armour and things medieval with his extraordinary metalsmithing talent to create individually etched, stamped, punched and hammered armours (some took more than 50 hours to complete) that grab your attention with their unlikely and often humorous purpose, and then cause you to think about the intriguing possibilities that they suggest. In addition to armour for mice, rats and cats, de Boer has also crated armour for the corporate executive, futuristic armour and armour as pure sculptural form.

The Canadian Craft Museum is excited to host Articulation, a retrospective exhibition of de Boer's unique creations which will also be his first solo exhibition in

CRAFTS on the INTERNET

You've got a computer, and a modem, and you've heard about this Internet thing. What's in it for you?

There's no way anyone can comprehensively answer that question, even with a whole book to talk about it, but I'll try to go over some of the finer points, to get you started on answering it for yourself.

The fastest growing, biggest, and most overwhelming part of the Internet is the World Wide Web (www). The amount of information available is staggering. Not all of it is useful, or even interesting, but the sheer volume of data already available is certainly a little awe inspiring.

For example: There are sites on the www called search engines which allow you to search the whole web for certain keywords or topics. On one such site called Yahoo, there are around 6,000 websites in the Arts, Hobbies and Crafts categories. That's an impressive number, and it doesn't begin to describe what's available. Subcategories include tapestries, quilting, pottery, woodworking, artist profiles, museums, galleries, and sculpture. This list is by no means complete.

You'll find electronic magazines, personal home pages, business storefronts, and much more on the 'net. You can learn more about your craft, share your experience with others who are interested, or shop for new materials and tools online.

Let's take beadwork as an example. Yahoo finds eighteen specific sites matching the keyword beadwork. One of them, the Chicago Bead Society, linked to a central index, called BeadNet, which in turn linked to many more sites on the 'net. From here you can find information about what people are doing with beads, where you can buy raw materials, and finished products, and more.

You won't find a useful website everywhere you look. Many are incomplete, or uninformative. You'll have to look around a little to find the best. With a little experience, this becomes easy, and you'll learn to screen out the majority of the useless sites very quickly.

So where do you start looking? Your first stop is usually a search engine like Yahoo. It's not the only one, and not necessarily the best either, but it's probably the most famous, and one of the easiest to use. Other popular search engines include Alta Vista and Lycos.

As in the case of BeadNet and others, most websites link to others on the net. Once you've found a good website, chances are it will be linked to the other good websites related to it.

You can find all manner of discussion in the arts and crafts newsgroups on Usenet. For example, in the rec.crafts beads newsgroup, current discussion topics include clasps, glues, Native American Beadwork, silver cleaning, bead books, and bead sources in London. Keep your eye out for websites when reading messages in Usenet. I ran across a link to a website, which turned out to be a www storefront for a bead supply company that operates out of Victoria, B.C.

Usenet is usually more interactive than the www. Messages you post here are circulated all around the world. Perhaps you're looking for a rare material that you haven't been able to find? Ask here. Maybe someone knows where to find it.

Mailing lists are similar to Usenet. They aren't as easy to find or use, but their content can be far more valuable.

So what's in it for you? If you haven't been online I can promise there's much more than you think. I haven't even scratched the surface of the potential for the Internet to be of use to you. You'll find homes for your other interests there too. Along the way, you might make a few friends, and maybe even put up a web page of your own.

There are a few things you should keep in mind about the Internet. It does have its darker side, but you can choose not to go there. The Internet is a medium for communication. It is not a teacher, a reference manual, a salesman, a mall, and most certainly it is not a censor. The Internet has no rules. It does have etiquette. Try not to get them mixed up.

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



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
