"THE PLEASURES OF MAKING" IN BRITISH COLUMBIA TODAY

Several questions come to mind as we begin this investigation. Why is making things by hand important in our society today? What drives British Columbian craftspeople to make what they do? What are their sources of inspiration and what are the ideas they seek to convey? Why have they chosen their particular materials and techniques to express their ideas? Or, to use the words of craftspeople in this exhibition, what is involved in making things by hand that renders the process so seductive, addictive, painful, joyful, pleasurable, satisfying, thought-provoking and exciting?

These are the principal issues we seek to address in this year's *Made By Hand* exhibition. So that we could explore them in some detail, a questionnaire was sent to all individuals accepted for the exhibition. Responses were thoughtful; some very detailed, others eloquent by their simplicity and bluntness. I composed the essays for each exhibitor (which comprise the remainder of the catalogue) using these responses along with additional biographical information supplied by the craftspeople. In them, I use their own works and descriptive phrases since these are the most lucid in conveying their thoughts and

feelings about the process of making by hand. They focus specifically on materials, techniques, sources of influence and inspiration and their intention is to convey the individuality and uniqueness of each craftsperson.

In what follows, I will explore the CABC's intentions for this exhibition and provide some insights into what the exhibitors suggest we think about when considering the pleasures of making. Before beginning this discussion though, it is perhaps also timely to review the history of the Made By Hand exhibition series, to consider why the CABC adopted *The Pleasures of Making* as our theme this year, and to celebrate our collaboration with The Canadian Craft Museum.

For many in British Columbia as well as crafts aficionados across Canada, the words "Made By Hand" are synonymous with two decades of quality juried exhibitions of contemporary crafts organized by the CABC. Sponsoring its first exhibition in 1972 at the Simon Fraser University Gallery, Burnaby, the title, *Made By Hand*, was adopted for the CABC's second exhibition at the Helen Pitt Gallery in 1975. It has been retained for all subsequent exhibitions: at the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria, 1978; the Vancouver Museum, 1983; the Charles H. Scott Gallery of Emily Carr College of Art and Design, Vancouver, 1985; as well as the Cartwright Gallery, Granville Island, Vancouver, in 1988 and again in 1990 during the Cartwright's metamorphosis to The Canadian Craft Museum.

Indeed, in its early years, *Made By Hand* was the only venue in British Columbia for exhibiting contemporary crafts. Consequently, the exhibition series has helped launch and solidify the careers of many notable British Columbian craftspeople including Tam Irving, Susan Cain and several winners of the Prix Saidye Bronfman Award - Wayne Ngan, Walter Dexter, Carole Sabiston and Joanna Staniszkis - artists today who are known internationally. Given annually since 1977 through the Canadian Crafts Council, the Bronfman is unquestionably the most prestigious and financially remunerative award a Canadian craftsperson can receive. Significantly, seven of the fifteen winners have been from British Columbia.

This year, the CABC is delighted to collaborate with The Canadian Craft Museum for the first time in its new location on Hornby Street in downtown Vancouver. The Museum is hosting the debut of Made By Hand: The Pleasures of Making and has also organized a two-year tour of the exhibition throughout British Columbia and across Canada.

When asked to reflect on the state of craft in British Columbia today, many of the exhibitors acknowledge "the lift" that the opening of The Canadian Craft Museum has given to crafts in this province by providing a venue for international crafts to be seen, as well as an additional vehicle for public education about provincial and national crafts. Our hope at the CABC is that this year's *Made By Hand* exhibition will be the first of many such collaborations.

Why *The Pleasures of Making* as subtitle and central focus for the 1993 *Made By Hand* exhibition? The idea, first suggested by Laurence Heppell, was inspired by Doris Shadbolt's presentation at the CABC symposium "Quo Vadis 20th Century Craft?" held in November 1991. While a brief excerpt of her address appears in her juror's statement, it is nevertheless, worth reminding ourselves of those aspects in the entire presentation which caught Heppell's attention and which intrigued all of us at the CABC.

In some respects then, Shadbolt opens a paradoxical door. Craftspeople themselves in the last few decades have been arguing against some of the distinctions she draws. They have fought for the legitimacy of their media to be recognized by fine arts galleries and bemoan the lack of exhibiting venues open to them in Canada. A plea is sent out to increase public awareness about the time and skills required to produce their work. Some go so far as to reject the designation of craftspeople, preferring instead that of artist. And several have sought to move away from traditional craft classifications, referring to their work as fibre art or glass art.

In order to convey the special qualities of craft that are inherent in the production process, *Made By Hand: The Pleasures of Making* moves away from the traditional 'group' craft exhibition which focuses on showing only finished pieces. Such exhibitions speak to the viewer and tend to stress the ultimate use of the piece, be it functional or decorative. Unintentionally, they tend not to speak of the maker or of the process of production - from sources of inspiration, through conceptualization, to production and completion. While no two craftspeople in *Made By Hand* express their personal pleasure in precisely the same way, nevertheless they share many common threads. Several mention their reaction to our prefabricated, mechanically oriented, throw-away society as a reason to celebrate making things by hand. Yet they also remind us that "made by hand" applies to the products of hobbyists, sweatshops the world over and the output of sign painters, stone masons and indeed anyone who makes something by hand, whatever it may be.

One aspect that all the exhibiting craftspeople share is a particular delight in working with their chosen materials, be they of yarn, fabric, wood, metal, paper, sequins, glass, or a particular clay or type of glaze. Likewise, they share the sentiment of neither becoming bored with that medium nor losing interest in its special qualities or thinking that all possibilities have been explored. Sometimes this is expressed by using language as a metaphor, wherein each material is recognized as unique, with its own particular nuances, vocabulary and grammar

Time and labour, often expressed in terms of the hours, days, or weeks it takes to produce a finished item, is another important element in the making process. Here, time is not of the essence; rather it is treasured. Conventionally considered to be part of the process, some also consider time to be one of their materials, albeit an intangible one. Slowness itself is relished because it allows time for reflection on the image in progress and the memories associated with it.




