

earless Exporting

BY ROSI NIEDERMAYER—You just got a call from a buyer in the US who asked you to quote a price "FOB Seattle" for a potential order. Great! What's FOB?

It's hard work the first time you sell outside Canada to get all the information to provide the buyer with a quote. Even after you give the quote you may be uncertain whether you included all of your costs.

The good news is that there are freight forwarders, shippers, and US Customs brokers to help you. They will be able to assist you in getting a correct quote back to the buyer and in filling out all of the export forms.

Shipping Terms

In North America, "FOB" is a common shipping term. This means that your quote to the buyer includes the price of the product, packing, shipping costs to Seattle, US Customs clearance, US Customs brokerage fee, and duty.

The shipping terminology affects more than who bears which costs. It also specifies the point where the risks and responsibilities pass from the seller to the buyer. When you send your quote back to the US buyer, spell out in simple, layman terms what costs your quote includes. Don't forget to specify either US or Canadian dollars.

Export Documentation

Clearing goods through US Customs can be a frustrating experience. If you have never exported before you may want to use a US Customs broker to

EXPORT QUOTE CHECKLIST

When preparing a quote for the buyer don't forget to include your profit as well as:

- Cost of product.
- Cost of packaging for export shipping.
- Cost of transportation.
- US Customs brokerage fee.
- Cost of duty and other fees.

assist you with this procedure. Improper and incomplete documention is the cause of most problems.

Commercial Invoice

A customs broker will be able to advise you which information to include in your commercial invoice to obtain the lowest duty rate. Your shipment may simply need a Commercial Invoice, just like a local sale. Also remember to include the US buyers IRS number which is required by US Customs.

NAFTA Certificate Of Origin

The North American Free Trade Agreement gives US, Mexican, and Canadian firms preferential tariff treatment for each others' products. Rules of origin are needed to determine when a product originates in one of the NAFTA countries. The NAFTA Certificate provides proof of origin and preferred import status (i.e., lower duty rate).

Some US Customs brokers have developed a single document which incorporates the Commercial Invoice and the NAFTA Certificate Of Origin.

Harmonized System Coding

To speed your shipment through customs, get the HS coding from the broker, or directly from US Customs.

They will also give you the duty rate.

US Customs Broker

The customs broker is a trade facilitator who assists in the clearance of goods through US Customs. If the value of your shipment is less than US \$1,250 and does not require duty, it can enter the US under an informal entry and you won't need a customs broker. Also, be sure to check with US Customs ahead of time to make certain that your shipment does not contain any items that may need additional forms.

Recognized Artist List

US Customs in Blaine and Seattle use a Recognized Artists List. The advantage to being on the list is that your shipments will clear US Customs quickly, and your product may go through duty free. To get on this list, you must send US Customs your biography and copies of any literature, pictures, magazine and newspaper articles that have been published about you or your work. Include formal education, list of showings, and any awards you have received. For more info. on the list, contact US Customs in Blaine at 206-332-6458.

The operational costs of the Canada Council are borne by the federal government; the money for the grants and awards comes partly from tax dollars and partly from interest from the founding endowment.

The Canadian Conference of the Arts (CCA) is an arts service organization and public society to which all can belong. The CCA is Canada's national arts lobby. It strives to affect decisions in government that will improve the art making environment in Canada.

The CCA holds annual conferences,

allowing members to stay abreast of the issues of concern to Canadian artists.

They also publish books and papers (and run an excellent FAX service) to ensure that members are kept aware of important issues affecting artists.

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THE ART BANK DILEMMA

As a response to the federal budget released in April, The Canada Council has undertaken a number of cost cutting measures in an attempt to weather the storm. One of their more controversial measures was to phase out the Art Bank program.

The Art Bank is an extensive national and international art lending operation comprising an 18,000 piece collection of Canadian contemporary art. The future of the Art Bank collection has direct importance to the artists whose works are part of the Bank. In addition, the private art dealers fear that any major sale of the collection will devastate the contemporary market.

The Canada Council indicated that it will establish a committee to figure out what it should do with the collection.

Many artists feel that all this new committee will be concerned with is how to get rid of the collection rather than finding a way to continue the work of the Art Bank.

Enter: the Canadian Conference Of The Arts, which has recently formed an Expert Advisory Committee. Composed of committed individuals from the arts community, the committee will attempt to reconsider the Art Bank closure, try to keep the collection together, help promote artists, and put it all in a report.

ARMS-LENGTH IN BC

As a response to more than twenty years of requests from the arts community, the provincial government's bill to establish an armslength Arts Council is almost a done deal. It remains for the Lieutenant-Governor to give royal assent. This step in the legislative process is usually routine.

The Council members will be chosen to represent the regions of the province and the full range of artistic activity. The 15-member council will disperse funding from the government, which this year increased its allocation to the cultural sector by \$4 million to a total of \$16 million. In addition to overseeing arts funding, the council will provide persons and organizations with opportunities to participate in arts and culture decision-making.

A History Of Paper

The word paper derives from the Latin word papyrus, in turn from the Greek word papyros, and originally from the Egyptian pa-prro. Five thousand years ago the people living along the Nile River started to make writing paper from the inner fibres of the stalk of the papyrus reed. Most experts trace the beginning of true papermaking to 105 AD, when Ts'ai Lun disclosed his research into making sheets using fibrous materials. The art of papermaking travelled west slowly, being brought to Spain by the Moors around 1100 AD. In the mid-fifteenth century, Johann Gutenberg developed the movable type printing press. This prompted the need for a high-production means for making paper, leading to today's electric-powered "Fourdrinier-type" papermaking machines.

Handmade paper is made from cellulose fibres (basically any plant materials) that have been pulped through maceration and beating processes (usually in a blender). The pulp then fills a mold made from a mesh enclosed in a wooden frame (called a deckle). Handmade papermaking can be learned at: Kakali Handmade Papers at 682-5274 and Nicole Dextras at 669-1551. Papier mâché is taught by Micheline Larose & Georges Gamache at 886-4985, and Wendy Murphy 731-3056.

ARTIST ALERT!

n April 7 of this year, Robyn Marie Prefontaine, doing business as "Made In B.C. Gift Gallery" in Vancouver, and "Zahia's" in Victoria, formally declared bankruptcy. Crowds of artists attended the closings attempting to recover their artwork and/or money owed them. These amounts ranged from \$200 to \$3,500 for each of the 150 craft artists involved. Thousands of

dollars are also owed to malls and utilities. The whereabouts of Prefontaine are unknown and bailiffs have locked the store doors.

The artists are organizing a series of meetings to take collective action. A private investigator is looking into the strange business practices of the former gallery, and the RCMP have been informed.

Many artists across the province are unaware that their artwork is under the trustee's lock and key, and that they may never recover work or money owing. Concerned artists should contact the "Artists Formerly Selling Through Made In B.C. Gallery" hotline: 604-254-5403.
