

On Tuesday, the World Crafts Council will present a keynote speech 'Design and Craft' and then four seminar sessions dealing with design and various aspects of craft.

Some people have queried the 'commitment to supply'. A contract to supply a specific amount of stock will not be provided. It will be up to the shop manager and the craftsperson how much initial stock is required. After the shop is opened the rate at which the stock sells will determine how much stock the shop manager

PRICING:

Circle Craft, in particular, asks that its members who intend to sell at The Craft Shop on Expo site, making their prices consistent at both locations. Therefore if they feel it necessary to raise their prices at the Expo shop they should do so at the Granville Island shop also.

PAYMENT:

Craftspeople will be paid monthly and by the Partner-ship, not by Expo. The exact details of payment will be worked out in the near future and participants will be told as soon as arrangements are finalised.

PRODUCT DESIGN AND SELECTION:

Explanation: In no way can any item have written on it, painted on it or in any other way depict any of the Expo trade marks or logos, Vancouver, B.C. or have a pictorial design of Expo, Vancouver, or any part of the city on it. The item can have "Made in Vancouver" or "Made in B.C." on it or on a card accompanying the item, as long as it doesn't make it a souvenir. Therefore the words should be

CLOTHING:

In January The "Partnership" stated that fashion accessories only will be accepted. CRAFT MUSEUM'S BENEFIT BREAKS RECORD; Market For Contemporary Crafts Drawing Serious Collectors: New York City, December 5 -- The American Craft Museum Associates' benefit for the Museum in November brought in more than \$300,000, announced Myrna Zuckerman, Chairman of the Associates. The event, attended by 650 people, featured a dinner, exhibition, sale and auction of art works by contemporary American craftsmen. Held at Windows on the World in New York City, it attracted new and established collectors from across United States.

The fact that this year's benefit broke records in both attendance and sales is indicative of the interest and excitement fine craft is evoking now," observed Zuckerman. "This year more than ever it was clear that new collectors are on the scene, evidenced by the first-time bidders and purchasers. In addition, the crowd at this event was the most diversified we've ever had. We counted among the participants a considerable number of noted architects, renowned designers and other prominent leaders in the arts."

Among the guest were Nancy and Thomas Hoving, Joan Mondale, Richard Meier, Lee Radziwell, Bonnie Cashin, Gloria Sachs, Neils Diffrient, Lella and Massimo Vignelli, Joan K. Davidson, Thomas Buechner and Melanie

Susie Elson, Chairman of the Council's Collectors Circle, noted that 62 Circle affiliates attended the benefit from as far away as southern Florida, Seattle and San Diego. The Collectors Circle, a select group of contemporary craft collectors founded in 1984, has already grown to 102 members nationwide. "Craft collectors have surfaced to join this group with great enthusiasm," Elson commented. "Most have been looking for a forum to meet with collectors from other parts of the country, to visit galleries, collections and artists' studios, and to join in the spirit of camaraderie and education that the Collectors Circle provides. The Museum Associates' annual benefit is considered by our members to be the most important event in the craft world, in terms of the opportunity to see and buy unique pieces."

AN EXHIBITION OF BOWLS BY CHARMAIN JOHNSON

I assert that currently in this region the most significant actualizations of tradition, outside of those of indigenous peoples, continue to be produced by a few masterful potters of which Johnson is one.

Her story is simple. Born in 1939, she received her university education at this institution. In the Department of Art Education in the mid sixties, she encountered Glenn Lewis, fresh from his apprenticeship with Bernard Leach at St. Ives in Cornwall. The standards of taste and skill, the organization of materials, methods, and processes, and the sensate reality of actual pots - which help to constitute a lineage stretching back unbroken to Ogata Kenzan in the seventeenth century - where passed to her then in germinal form.

For Johnson, this tradition had to be embodied and owned in the personal and disciplined Way of the Potter if true continuity and authentic speaking in her metier were to be effected. Strong support was provided through her close association with Michael Henry, another Leach apprentice, and Gathie Falk, with whom she built her first kiln in 1966, as well as from the publications with which Japanese have documented their venerable ceramic history. More importantly, she cites museum collections abroad as her focus of graduate studies. She mentions with particular affection the George Eumorfopoulos Collection in the British Museum, London; the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford; the Percival David Foundation of Chinese Art, London; and Collections Baur, Geneva. All of these collections are renowned for their holdings of exquisite samples of Song Dynasty wares.

In 1974, while Johnson was helping Bernard Leach catalogue his own choice and wide-ranging collection, she discussed with him the works of Lucy Rie, then at hand (she also met Rie at that time). Since her student days, Rie's thin, elegant and articulated pieces had been her exemplars. The bibliographic tradition points

to the influence on Rie of Roman pottery excavated in the Vienna region and her schooling at the Kunstgewerbeschule, and consistently overlooks her professed interest in Song Dynasty wares in Vienna museums. Such were the strands of the tradition which finally coalesced in Charmain Johnson's East Vancouver studio, where she inherited and rebuilt Henry's own kiln eleven years ago.

For almost eight years Johnson has concentrated on the production of bowls - small, precise, elegant. The form offers to her the ultimate intellectual challenge, that of reconciling foot to bowl, inside to outside, glaze to body, and pot to killn location. Her accomplishment results from the economy of natural action. Rims are thrown, never trimmed. Glazes are deftly poured. Further decoration is extremely rare. It is the excellence of these few out of the approximately four thousand bowls that she has thrown that hold her attention and compel ours. All produced within a stringently limited repertoire of ingredients and techniques; they are high-fired (cone 10), porcelanous, and of assorted and personally developed bodies.

One of the major reasons for exhibiting her works now is that supplies of several of the components she has been using, including Kingman feldspar, are no longer available - signalling a possible ending to this era of her work. Small bowls provided her with the perfect format for testing both glaze and kiln technology. Recently, she has expressed an interest in moving on to bigger bowls and cylinders.

The check list indicates that she considers a number of these works to be tea bowls. Since Johnson herself is not a devotee of Chanoyu, and since they are not made for a clientele that participates in the ceremony, the term is idiosyncratic, although quite particular. Since they are neither unomi nor chawan in shape, nor raku in technique, Johnson's intention is to align them only broadly to stoneware items of earliest usage. The reference signals that these items, unique even in her output, warrant a special attention. Their exceptional presence is to be accorded a quite and reverent contemplation, like unto that practiced in the Japanese Way of Tea. Certainly I have experienced through these bowls a sense of place, of passing phenomena, of peace, and of poetry. Something wondrous and even beyond intention is achieved or expressed here - such are the dividends of mastery and risk.

This is the first formal, public exhibition of the work of Charmain Johnson since she started potting twenty years ago. A huge commitment and an iron will — that is what it takes. There is a sign that you passed on the way in here. It is my intention that when passing it again upon leaving, it will be viewed not only as a name but as a human quality — the ineluctable character of excellence rarely seen in our time.

AN EXHIBITION OF BOWLS, U.B.C. Fine Arts Gallery October 29- - December 21, 1985

When entering this gallery full of small, care given pots individually enshrined, I had that momentary ache of anticipation at finding a treasure experienced before in pottery rooms crowded with historic collections. Glenn Allison, the curator, surely collaborated with Charmain Johnson by presenting her pots in such a visually strong and enjoyable manner. I would not have appreciated these pots as much without this equisitely engaging installation.

The bowls immediately brought me to consider their formal, abstract relationships. The scale was small, intimate, handheld. The colour palette was rich and subtle, with a range of play in soft hues of celadons from pale grey to ivory greens and blues. The texture was smooth, clean, precise and delicate without being hard or fragile. The shapes were simple, open, thinly potted where one's eye was drawn to the relationship of parts - the foot, body and rim - potters play and potters perpetual fascination, with a knowing emphasis on the interchange between inside and out. There was a sense of delicate utility and unity as in a robin's egg. Charmain turns or trims the foot of her bowls, which alters and accentuates the fullness of the exterior curve. I found the softer, rounder, celadon glazed pots the most satisfying. I was less convinced with the more chiseled, harder shapes with dark, dryer glazes. However, I enjoyed the fact that this potter uses Bear Creek Clay and local ash in her glazes. And I wanted to be able to see the underside of the foot and to feel it in my hands, but my eyes had a rich dessert none-
