- You will have noted that many CABC-sponsored events are taking place at the EMILY CARR COLLEGE OF ART AND DESIGN. We would like to take this opportunity to thank **Anita Sharp** and her capable staff for making this possible.
- The CABC BOARD OF DIRECTORS at their May 1990 meeting gave unanimous approval to a motion accepting the newly written **CABC Personnel Manual** as presented by Personnel Committee Chairperson **Micki MacKenzle**, who, with the capable assistance of **Jean Kares** and consultant, **Ellen Lefevre**, wrote a Manual to meet the needs of the CABC for the future.
- Following right after at the June 1990 meeting, Jim Thornsbury, Chairperson of the ADVOCACY COM-MITTEE and his able colleagues, Penny Gouldstone,

Lloyd Herman and Peggy McLernon, who had prepared and presented the FRAMEWORK POLICY, received unanimous approval for their efforts. The following excerpt contains the Mission Statement, followed by the Statement of Aims.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Crafts Association of British Columbia believes in the importance of Craft Objects that bear a message of human warmth and understanding, provide standards of excellence to other forms of production and contribute grace to our environment. In the belief that the value of the visual arts is that it gives form to human experience, the Crafts Association of British Columbia promotes beautifully made objects, their creators, and a caring, attentive audience.

The Crafts Association of British Columbia will be governed by knowledgeable and skilled trustees, kept upto-date through resource and professional development. It will be partners with all levels of government, other arts organizations and social institutions to create a positive climate which will allow crafts in British Columbia to develop to their full potential.

STATEMENT OF AIMS

The Crafts Association of British Columbia will work in partnership with:

- The Trustees and staff of the Canadian Crafts Council and all Provincial Craft Associations to coordinate research, exchange data and aid in projects of mutual interest by 1991.
- The Trustees of British Columbia craft organizations to coordinate efforts to publish a periodical focused to educate and enlighten the general public in craft by 1990.
- The Provincial Government to recognize the value of craft both economically and socially and to develop policies geared to create as positive a climate as possible for the growth and well-being of the craft sector by 1992.
- 4. The Ministry of Education and local school trustees to establish policy to recognize the arts, including the crafts, to be a vital part of the curriculum from kindergarten through grade 12 by 1993.
- The Ministry of Post-Secondary Education to develop policy and programs that will establish craft education through the graduate level to be available in the province by 1994.
- The Municipal Governments to establish cultural policies based on the framework policies of arts organizations by 1995.
- 7. Regional leaders who will be identified and trained to facilitate craft development programs by 1991.

- programs to improve the public awareness of crafts through the following:

 8. Crafthouse will develop educational programs to foster

- Educational exhibitions will be in place in at least three prime venues, for example, the airport, British Columbia Ferries, hotels, etc. by 1991.
- An updated and improved slide portfolio of British Columbia craftspeople will be developed with promotional procedures by 1992.
- Historical research of crafts in British Columbia will be underway by 1992.
- One event will be developed to honour or celebrate "Craftsperson of the Year" award—in partnership with the Provincial Government by 1992.
- The media (television, radio and newspapers) will present regular reports on the crafts and craftspeople of British Columbia by 1992.

NEW DISCOUNT POLICIES:

DISCOUNT FOR CABC MEMBERS

CABC members are eligible for a 10% reduction on purchases made at Crafthouse. The discount was approved recently by the board of Trustees and is provided as a gesture of appreciation and good will towards the membership. Those who wish to receive the discount should have their CABC membership card available at point of sale. In the event of a sale to a CABC member, the consignment structure would be as follows:

- CRAFTSPERSON/SUPPLIER will receive 60% of retail value (if they are a CABC member)
- CRAFTSPERSON/SUPPLIER will receive 55% of retail value (if they are not a CABC member)
- CRAFTHOUSE will retain 30% or 35% depending on whether the supplier is a member.

DISCOUNT TO THE TRADE

Crafthouse will allow a 10% discount to designers, consultants, and other related professionals. By providing the discount, work available from Crafthouse will be more accessible to trade professionals, and more competitively priced for them. The purchase of work by these professionals for their clients provides the opportunity for a broader profile and use of crafts. Ultimately the potential for exposure, commissioned works and greater awareness about crafts and living and working with them could be realized. The discount is provided to the trade to help stimulate more business and dialogue with them. After considerable discussion it has been established that the discount will be absorbed equally by both the supplying craftsperson and Crafthouse.

The following explains the consignment structure:

— WORK SOLD BY A CABC MEMBER

In the event of a sale of work made by a CABC member to the general public, the terms are as follows:

CABC MEMBER will receive 60% of retail value

CRAFTHOUSE will retain 40%

In the event of a sale of work made by a CABC member to the Trade, the terms are as follows:

- CABC MEMBER will receive 55% of retail value
- CRAFTHOUSE will retain 35%

WORK SOLD BY A NON-MEMBER

In the event of a sale of work made by a non-member to the general public, the terms are as follows:

- NON-MEMBER will receive 55% of retail value
- CRAFTHOUSE will receive 45%

In the event of a sale of work made by a non-member to the Trade, the terms are as follows:

- NON-MEMBER will receive 50% of retail value
- CRAFTHOUSE will retain 40%

THE JEAN A. CHALMERS FUND FOR THE CRAFTS: SPRING 1990 RESULTS

Ottawa, 24 May 1990—The Jean A. Chalmers Fund for the Crafts enables the Canada Council's Visual Arts section to assist groups of professional craftspeople or non-profit crafts organizations who wish to undertake projects that have a theoretical or practical application in the development or advancement of the crafts in Canada.

Each year an amount of up to \$50,000, divided between two competitions, is available to the Canada Council to support research, special projects and workshops for the crafts in Canada. This sum represents the income from an endowment of \$500,000 made to the Canada Council by Jean A. Chalmers of Toronto.

The grants are made through two yearly juried competitions. The first of two juries for the current fiscal year was held on 12 April 1990. The jury recommended grants totalling \$25,404 for the following:

Artists in Stained Glass, Toronto: \$3,000 toward the costs of lectures and workshops by visiting British glass artist Patrick Reyntiens.

Ann Bird, Ottawa: \$3,500 toward the costs of research into quilts made by native women in Canada.

Centre des metlers du verre di Québec, Montréal: \$7,350 toward the costs of workshops featuring Italian master-glass artists Luciano Vistosi and Lino Taglapietra.

artists Luciano Vistosi and Lino Taglapietra. **Harbourfront, Toronto:** \$4,000 toward the costs of a short-term, cross-media workshop entitled The Fabric Workshop at Harbourfront.

Metal Arts Guild of Nova Scotia, Halifax: \$554 toward the costs of a workshop with British jeweller Wendy Ramshaw, in conjunction with the juried exhibition "The Medium is Metal 1990."

Ontario Crafts Council. Toronto: \$6,000 toward the costs

Ontario Crafts Council, Toronto: \$6,000 toward the costs of publishing a book entitled *Business Administration for the Artists and Craftsperson*.

Alexandra Palmer, Toronto: \$1,000 toward the costs of a research project entitled Au Courant: Contemporary Canadian Fashion.

NEW GALLERY OPENS IN TLELL

TLELL, May 21—'Well worth a special trip might be the recommendation for Body Currents, if we were a tourist guide that rated local attractions.

Admittedly, the location is unlikely, just off Wiggins Road in Tlell. But it is literally a 45-second drive off the highway, and it definitely is worth a special trip.

Body Currents is a gallery, displaying and selling the work of Tlell jewellery designer Morgan Bristol. Morgan Bristol, who learned his craft at the Alberta College of Art, has exhibited in West Germany, Vancouver, and Toronto, and now calls Tlell home. He works in gold, silver, copper, plexi and rubber, and creates original and interesting jewellery, both traditional, such as rings and earrings, and less traditional, such as body and leg jewellery.

"I'm interested in creating humour, detail, and I enjoy revealing the process through the manifestation of my work," Morgan said.

Also on exhibit is the work in wood of accompanying artist Ron Durrance, who carves masks and spoons, themselves worth a close look, since spoons such as these are frightfully difficult to make.
