



MODERN TRIUMPHS IN CLAY

minor art - an occupation practiced by provincial artisans laboring over fiery kilns to produce utilitarian or decorative wares of minimal aesthetic interest or value. And yet the heritage of the potter is a noble one, and the molding of clay has been practiced from the prehistoric ages to the present. From the first, pottery expression. ng engaged the imagination of craftsmen whose lega formed the foundation for near-limitless creative

Japan to the great ceramic traditions of China and Japan to the decorative splendors of the Middle East, Muslim Spain and Renaissance Italy, from the refinements of Sevres and Meissen to the nineteenth-century cross-cultural revival of the Arts and Crafts Movement in England, from the stylistic innovations of Art Nouveau to the marvels of twentieth-century studio potters, the history of pottery is as continuous, complex and dazzling as that of any other art form.

In the last quarter of the nineteenth century, the pottery industry began to be reevaluated in Britain. John Ruskin and William Morris called for the raising of standards in all of the arts, notably to eliminate the ornamental excesses wrought by mass production in Victorian England. It was a call that gave rise to the Arts and Crafts Movement in 1886, which held that the craftsman was far superior to the machine.

the order of the movement, and its tenets spread throughout Europe. But it was in modern-day England that the "decorative" arts, pottery in particular, assumed their rightful stature and extraordinary refinement. The principal protagonists were studio potters, whose visionary approaches to style and technique transformed a so-called minor art into a major creative genre. Artist-potters such as Bernard Leach, Michael Cardew, William Staite Murray, Norah Braden, Hans Coper and Lucie Rie emerged as singular Restraint and a search for a new simplicity was

he believed that there was no distinction between the craftsman and the artist, and that the potter was responsible for every phase of his work, from the preparation of clay to the throwing and decorating of figures of the twentieth century.

Among them, Bernard Leach was undoubtedly the most renowned and influential. An impassioned theorist every pot.

Leach was raised in the Far East and traveled widely in the Orient, and his chief contribution to art was his celebration of the ceramic traditions of soon produced wares that in form, function and dec-oration strongly echoed the precepts of the most eminent Japan. Upon his return to England in 1920, he established his own studio at St. Ives in Cornwall and, in consort with the Japanese potter Shoji Hamada, created a workshop along the lines of Oriental rural potteries. In time, and for over half a century, Leach adapted his knowledge of Eastern pottery to the traditional English wares, thus establishing a philosphy and working methods that through the years would inspire countless artistpotters who would stretch traditional values to encompass of sculpture and contemporary

design. Two such artists were the German-born Hans Coper and the Austrian-trained Lucie Rie, both of whom settled in England as refugees from Nazism. Highly disciplined and inventive in matters of form, surface and design, Coper approached pottery making on the "less is more" principle, infusing his works with the sprit that guided artists of the Bauhaus and sculptors such as Giacometti and Brancusi. Often unusual in proportion, the pieces of this unrivaled craftsman are among the most refined examples of modern pottery. Lucie Rie, whom Coper assisted during their early years in England, produced works directly inspired by classical Greek and Roman pottery. Her exquisite columnar bottles with flaring tops, bearing subtly striated glazes of varying colors, evoke a purity that no longer relied on the traditions of Chinese and Japanese folk potteries, but found its own individually motivated expressiveness.

Today the art of the studio potter has entered the stream of the fine arts. More and more, collectors and connoisseurs look on the potter as the equal of the painter and sculptor. What had been almost total indifference on the part of the commercial and academic world has turned into genuine and enthusiastic interest with galleries and museums now exhibiting and acquiring examples of the finest contemporary wares by potters world over

what had traditionally been a ceremonial craft shaped by everyday need has emerged as a vehicle for trenchant aesthetic thought. The twentieth-century studio potter has moved from the realm of specialization into that world-class creativity - an artist who has come. an artist whose

Report on Circle Craft Board Meeting March 3, 1986

Finance. February sales were up \$4300 over February 1985. 1984/85 Financial statements are in the process of being prepared.

Management. This committee now has two new members to help Sheila Roberts; Rudi Diesvelt and Linda Andrews. Stella has now left on her 6 mos. leave of absence.

Granville Island. The Board has accepted Granville Island's proposal for rental of the Kwik Save space. Hopefully, by the time you read this, we will have a signed lease. The Granville Island Trust appears to be enthusiastic to have us in what they are referring to as their new Arts & Crafts Centre. We don't know exactly when we are moving, but hope it is approximately 15th April. Please let the office know if you have time to help move. This is going to be a huge job and only those who are able to make a firm committment (depending on timing) are asked to volunteer.

The Granville Island Committee will become the Shop Committee once the negotiating function of the former is completed. The Shop Committee will be responsible for co-ordinating the store design.

Special Events. Due to the pending move, there is not much we can plan for special events until we see how we are going to fill up the space we have, how we will be able to plan for a Christmas Market, etc.

Expo. We now have a contract. Circle Craft must sell the work of the provinces and territories, as well as the work of the demonstrators at Expo, without their having to go through the Selections Committee. However, they will occupy 24% of the space and if sales after the first month do not equal 24% of the total, they will be allotted less space. 195 people went through selections, with 134 passing. There is a sizeable waiting list. Nothing has been decided about this list at this time. Those of you selling work at Expo will have your information packages now and your work must be submitted by April 7th. The store will open April 12th.

Selections. A ballot form and biographies were printed in the last newsletter, with a deadline for voting of March 31st. The present selections committee has agreed to carry on until the next Board meeting when two new members will be selected by the Board. The majority of the nominations have come from the staff and the Board.

Canadian Craft Conference. Circle Craft will subsidize up to 50% of the registration costs for 3 interested co-op members to attend the Canadian Crafts Conference to be held at UBC in August. Selected participants must aply to Circle Craft in writing, stating why they wish to participate in the conference. Deadline for submission is May 1st.

Accepted participants will be expected to provide a written report on the conference to the Board of Circle Craft after the Conference.

There will be an Open House night for all craftspeople and their studios on Granville Island during the Conference. Circle Craft will participate in this Granville Island Open House night.

CABC. The Board has voted to present a gift to CABC for the new house. We use their board room for our meetings and are very grateful to do so (as anyone who has ever had a meeting at night time in the Circle Craft store will appreciate). Gift to be decided by Diana Sanderson.

Membership. From now on, all members of Circle Craft, whether a member of CABC or not, and whether or not Circle Craft has their newsletter within the CABC newsletter, will receive the CABC newsletter. If you know of anyone who should be receiving the newsletter and is not, or if you are in receipt of 2 newsletters, please let Circle Craft know.
