### TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE 12MONTHS ENDED APRIL 30/86

Cash on hand at April 30, 1986 was \$40,154 and after allowing for accounts receivable and payable, and liabilities, membership equity was \$26,589. This compares with membership equity of \$35,694 at the same time last year.
The reduction in membership equity occurred because last year's equity was boosted by advance fundraising for the building project. Overall, our financial position has improved considerable from financial position has improved considerable from The financial statements for our 1985-86 fiscal year

a few years ago when membership equity was \$2,654. low as

Funds available for general operating purposes at the end of the fiscal year were \$8,552 compared with \$2,241 for the prior year. This increase is due to the successful "Casino Nights" fundraising event at the end of the yearfrom which we realized over \$7,000. Unfortunately, it appears that such events will be less lucrative in future under the recently revised regulations and we will have to continue to rely on other sources for operating funds. One of these is membership fees which in our 1985-86 fiscal year contributed only \$14,373 or about one third of general operating and administrative expenses, and one twelfth of total Association expenditures. The principal source of revenue for 1985-86 was government grants of \$101,438, including \$75,000 for the building project; this compares with government grants of \$24,534 for 1984-85. Fundraising events generated \$17,455 for the year, up significantly from \$1,185 in 1984-85. The major expenditures of \$39,809 (\$5,506 in 1984-85), administration expenses of \$39,809 (\$39,803 in 1984-85), administration expenses of \$39,809 (\$39,803 in 1984-85), and the Crafthouse store expenditures of funds before too long, during the early stages it has and will require financial supports.


