It's fast approaching—the opening of the new centre for the Ontario Crafts Council (OCC) takes place Dec. 2, 1:30-5:30 pm. Celebrations include: an unveiling of twelve built-in art commissions; the presentation of \$6,000 in cash awards for the exhibition Ontario Crafts '89; the reopening of Canada's largest library devoted to craft; and the launching of a new, upbeat store for craft.

The Honourable Lincoln M. Alexander, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, presides over the cutting of a 45-foot silk ribbon designed by textile artist Marie Lloyd. This ceremony marks the creation of a vital new visual arts centre at 35 McCaul Street in Toronto's Queen West neighbourhood. The renovation of two 1920s industrial buildings by Armstrong Molesworth Shepherd Architects is in the completion stage.

The OCC is devoting an unprecedented 2% of the \$7.3 million building budget to built-in art works that are integral to the renovation.

Ontario Crafts '89, a juried survey show of the finest craft in the province, is the inaugural exhibition in the Craft Gallery. The Premier of Ontario, the Honourable David Peterson, is sponsoring the \$2,000 Premier's Award for the best in the show. Eighteen other prizes bring the total award money to over \$6,000.

The Craft Resource Centre, a library and research facility, opens on the second floor expanded to 5 times its former space. Over 1,100 books, 160 periodicals, 500 artist portfolios, and 310 slide sets are available to the public on a reference basis.

Craftworks, the OCC's second retail space, bridges the worlds of art and utility with handmade articles which enhance everyday life in a useful way. The store concept is the work of Dan Cowling and Liz Gabaldo of Zones Design Inc.,

a young Toronto design firm. The Guild Shop, the Council's original store, in business since 1932, remains at 140 Cumberland Street.

35 McCaul, which has been named Chalmers Building in acknowledgement of the ongoing support of M. Joan and Jean A. Chalmers, is now a strong focus for arts activity. Other organizations located in the OCC's new space include: the Art Rental and Sales Gallery program of the Art Gallery of Ontario, the Ontario College of Art, Esprit Orchestra, Ontario Handweavers and Spinners, Artists in Stained Glass and the Canadian Bookbinders and Book Artists Guild. SACRED CELEBRATION

On Nov. 5, St. Andrew's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Toronto, celebrates a joyous occasion—the dedication of new stained glass windows by well-known glass artist Lutz Haufschild, produced by the studios of Wilhelm Derix, Taunusstein, West Germany. This addition to the church represents the greatest artistic change to the sanctuary since 1879, when St. Andrew's, on the corner of Jarvis and Cariton Streets in downtown Toronto, was dedicated.

PROJECTS ON THE ISLAND

Building 27, located across from the Granville Island Hotel, is nearing completion. The structure, designed by Island architect Barbara Dalrymple, is comprised of five artisan studios, with occupancy planned for this fall. Tenants will include the U.B.C. School of Architecture, who will be using one studio temporarily for student work, paper manufacturer Kakali Handmade Papers, owned and operated by Island

artist Sharyn Yuen, and a group of four talented boat manufacturers operating as the Alder Bay Boat Company, who will be making small traditional boats and canoes. The fourth studio will be occupied temporarily by the Island festivals, and the exciting fifth bay, located at the east end of the building, shall be retained for an equally exciting tenancy, yet to be determined. ARTS UMBRELLA

Arts Umbrella has undertaken a successful capital fundraising campaign and have now begun work on the addition of 5,000 sq. ft. to their current 10,000 sq. ft. of studio and office space. The additions include large performance and visual arts studios, new changing facilities and storage space.

Editorial

Dear Members,

Having been responsible for the past two issues of "Craft Contacts" and have just being granted the position of the CABC's editor on a permanent basis, I can say that I'm excited!

At this point, I see "Craft Contacts" as a great aid to craftspeople in terms of being a representative voice and a thorough source of various types of information. However, I believe the newsletter has the potential for further growth.

I see the newsletter as an ideal device for the promotion of craft. Without compromising its mandate of being a periodical for craftspeople, "Craft Contacts" could do more to address the layman's interest in local artists. I envision feature articles on the craftspeople exhibiting their work in the Crafthouse alcove, plus reviews on other shows going on in the city. I like to think too that someday "Craft Contacts" will have visual documentation of such events.

All this, I realize, takes money. But it's capital that, in my opinion, could be easily obtained with a little work. Over the past three months I have been contacted by a few suppliers who want the availability of their products known to craftspeople. They ask either for the CABC's membership list or to advertise in "Craft Contacts." I believe if we had a system established whereby we could service these people at a guaranteed profit, we could raise the capital needed to expand the newsletter. I also see moneys being acquired by branching out the CABC's membership to include interior designers, architects and retailers. Ultimately this would promote the work of our artists.

As well, I will be spending several days a month working as Ron Kong's assistant in Crafthouse. I believe this will be very beneficial in terms of learning more about the craftspeople and communicating such information in the newsletter.

Our province has a wellspring of talent that I feel more people should know about. Now as the CABC's editor, it is my mission to get the word out.

Crafthouse

One of North America's finest potters, Gordon Hutchens, has his work on exhibit in the Crafthouse Alcove for the month of November. The pots, which range in size from

medium to large, are somewhat sculptural with ceramic "driftwood" handles. All are raku fired with surface colour of matt black, gold and copper irridescents. In this month's "Ceramic Monthly" there is an article on Gordon in which these pots are featured.

"If the Walls Could Talk," clay sculpture by Elaine Brewer-White, will be featured in the alcove in December. This new series of work looks at fragmented rooms where some kind of incident has just taken place. For example, a T.V. set flashes a winning lottery number at an empty sofa chair, or muddy footprints going down a hall, coming from an open window. The clues left behind allow the viewer to reach his or her own conclusions.

This series is varied in its display, with wallpieces and 3-D pieces, some of which use electrical lights to illuminate rooms behind half-open doors or what is outside a window.

Currently, Elaine Brewer-White exhibits her work across Canada and the western U.S. She has also founded the company 'Culture Talks' which connects visual artists with the community through presentations and workshops. She is also chasing after her two-year-old...

As well, Maria Szijarto will be responsible for the December Christmas Crafthouse window installation. Marina's piece, entitled "Virgin Mary," explores the pagan meaning of those two words as well as a mixture of media.

'SHINING EXAMPLES' OF CANADIAN JEWELLERY

Three new exhibitions opening on November 17 at the Cartwright Gallery showcase the best of Canadian jewellery and metalwork. Under the umbrella title *Shining Examples*, are "Personal Geography/Interior Mythology," the 43rd annual juried show of the Metal Arts Guild; "Lois Etherington Betteridge, Silversmith: Recent Work," and "Holiday Adornments," an exhibition and sale by jewellery program students at Vancouver Community College. All will continue through December 31, 1989.

"In the last decade we have seen ideas of personal adornment expand to include much more than circle pins or pearl strands," Cartwright Gallery Director Lloyd Herman says in a statement introducing the three exhibitions. "Contemporary jewellery still includes fastidious creations of precious metals and gemstones, but other materials, and ideas from art and craft disciplines have freed the jewellers to experiment. The education of jewellers and metalsmiths has moved beyond technical training to embrace artistic and social concerns, fresh concepts of personal adornment, and an understanding of fashion and marketing. These three exhibitions examine contemporary diversity in jewellery and metalsmithing on a national scale; the consistently high quality of creativity and workmanship of one of Canada's most respected metalsmiths; and the inspired jewellery

made from a variety of materials by students in Vancouver's only academic jewellery education program."

"Personal Geography/Interior Mythology" includes 45 examples of jewellery, functional tablewares and small sculptures by 33 established and emerging artists in metal. The exhibition, selected from submissions by Metal Arts Guild members across Canada, emphasizes the organization's long commitment to excellence in metal design and technique.

"The metal artist's interior landscape contains many features of interest; aesthetic and social concerns, deeply-felt personal symbols and mythology," according to the poster/catalogue accompanying the exhibition. "In 'Personal Geography/Interior Mythology' metal artists explore this mysterious terrain through body adornment, implements and *objets*. Aboriginal totems, icons of the technological age, fragments of autobiography—the results are as varied as these influences melded in the mind of the artist."

Lois Etherington Betteridge has, for more than 35 years, contributed to the revival of artistic metalworking in North America. Her education in the 1950s, and the examples of Scandinavian functional objects studied then have contributed to the evolution of her unique style. She has built on the silversmith's heritage of function, imbuing her designs with originality. Objects in this exhibition emphasize her recent involvement with geometric form, and the creation of serving pieces that celebrate the rituals of food and drink.

Such rituals are not necessarily serious, however. The Guelph, Ontario, artist shows a sense of humour in giving her objects names like "Madhatter's Tea Party," "Bonbons on High" and "Jujube Tree." Such works exemplify her wit, but others, like "Star Wars," show a concern for the earth and those who live on it.

The artist's exemplary achievements in her field have been hnoured both in the United States and Canada. She is a Distinguished Member of the Society of North American Goldsmiths, and the 1978 recipient of the Saidye Bronfman Award for Excellence in Crafts.

"Lois Etherington Betteridge, Silversmith: Recent Work" was organized by the Art Gallery of Hamilton, Ontario. Of the 51 objects in the exhibition most were made in 1987 and 1988. An exhibition catalogue is available at the Cartwright Gallery where, on Saturday, November 18 at 3 in the afternoon, Judy Mackness will give a slide talk on the artist and her work.

"Holiday Adornments" provides to Cartwright Gallery visitors the opportunity to discover the creative young jewllers emerging from the two-year diploma program, Jewellery Art and Design, at Vancouver Community College. The young program, established in 1988 at VCC's Vancouver Vocational Institute, fuses the traditions of European training with the latest creative techniques within the context of art and costume.

Jewellery by approximately 30 second-year students in the program will be sold at the Cartwright Gallery in a temporary sales exhibition area staffed by the students. Their jewellery will emphasize non-precious materials and con-

temporary sculptural concepts applied to body adornment. Most will be priced under \$200.

The Cartwright Gallery is located on Granville Island at 1411 Cartwright Street, Vancouver, BC, V6H 3R7. It is open to the public without charge 10-5, Tuesday through Saturday, and 11-3 on Sunday.
