



Brent Raphael of Vanderhoof was the other wood-crafter chosen to receive a Most Outstanding: Juror's Choice Award. He also won top honours in the sculptural carving category with his framed original nature art. The jurors praised his unique pieces, saying the use of wood give his work depth and personality. Raphael said he participated to get an idea of how he's doing after 10 years as an artist as well as to get the useful tips it promised. "I wanted to see how I stood up against other artists." He liked the concept of focusing on wood too. "It was nice to play on a level playing field." Raphael's work fits in with the emphasis on making maximum use of all fibre because he uses all the wood, even tiny chips.

Kevin Taylor and Amber Shipley of Kitchie Creek Log Works of Prince George took first place in the indoor furniture and decor category with a rocker, table, and chair. The jury praised the furniture they submitted, remarking on its unique design. Taylor said it's a business that is just getting going. It grew

out of the tree fallers' need to keep busy. He started it on the tailgate of his truck because he was so bored while working in an isolated northern area. He then decided to build a business, so he could have work that isn't seasonal and could be at home more. "Our biggest stumbling block is marketing. It's scary because we don't really know what we're doing." They were invited to participate in the competition by one of the organizers. Taylor said they had been intending to enter another show but ran out of product because of Christmas sales. This was a good alternative. "We got positive feedback from the jury."

The sculpted boxes category first place went to Stuart Simpson and Christine Kelly of Wild Woods Unlimited, an Atlin, BC company. Jurors praised the unique design and satin-smooth finish. Kelly said this was their first juried show. Their government agent gave them a pamphlet and since they work with local wood it seemed appropriate. The I8-month old company has developed a market in the Yukon since the two got together to try to make a business out of the interest they share. This was a chance to emerge from their relative isolation. Kelly said they wanted to learn how to market elsewhere. "We thought it would be a good forum for us to venture into the south."

The arrow shafts made by Timberstar Mfg. Ltd.. was the Most Value-added Wood Product. Juror's Choice Award and the evaluation said it showed excellent use of local fibre and marketable craftsmanship. John Wiebe said the company makes automatic graders for planer mills but has been working on the arrow shaft product for five years and was seeking more exposure and information to access world markets. They are unique because the shafts are made up of six even pieces of wood glued together. That makes a strong, even and balanced shaft. Wiebe said the Vanderhoof company wants to market in the US, Europe, Australia, and Japan. "We're just getting going with this.

Rick Kost of J&S Log Furniture in Big Lake, BC won in the outdoor furnishings and decor category. The jurors praised the simple designs and good use of materials in the furnishing which is suited for cottages, chalets, and log cabins. Kost said he participated in the forum because he needs to learn about business matters such as G&T, marketing, and pricing He said he appreciated the evaluation and the chance to attend seminars at the forum.

All of the above have been shown in many different kinds of exhibitions where Scheuing work has been sought because of its innovative approach to materials and because her art initiates many levels of dialogue without being didactic on topics as diverse as feminism, paternalism, aesthetics and transformation.

Her solo shows – Anatomy of the suit (Textile Museum, Toronto); Radical Textiles (Southern Exposure, San Francisco, California); Geometry of the Body (Owens Art Gallery, Sackville, N.B.); Intertextile (Art Gallery of Southwestern Manitoba, at Brandon); 13 men or Penelope (shown in Montreal, Moncton and Fredericton); Alterations (The Other Gallery, Banff): Use-ful/Use-less (Anna Leonoens Gallery, Hallfax) and Scheuing inclusion in two dozen group exhibitions between 1984 and the present in Canada and abroad attest to her high profile as a visual artist.

In addition Scheuing is also a respected and innovative teacher/administrator who currently heads the Textile Art programme at Capilano College which has been reshaped and refined under her direction. CABC's nominee for the Jean A. Chalmers award has received appropriate recognition for her outstanding, frontier-expanding contribution to textile art in the broadest sense.




