CCC BOARD MEETING - MARCH 1985



"To date woodturning (bowl making) is for me a predominately expressive act rather than the fabrication of utilitarian form. Frequently my works are rendered literally non-functional by virtue of noticed and accentuated peculiarities of the chosen block. I regard myself as a vehicle for the expression of something inherent in the wood itself, something which can come into being only through my vision fused with the wood's turning. In my view, the bowl's ultimate function is to command space, to distinguish its environment, and to display my own harmony with the nature of the wood. In that sense, the bowl is always already full."

His bowls are not preconceived. "My work is one of a kind production. Each piece is unique in that it has its own characteristics that are inherent in every tree. Each bowl takes its form as I turn it."

While he uses an array of commercially available imported hardwoods, David has a special affection for indigenous woods which are procured and seasoned by him. His backyard has the appearance of a graveyard of stumps, spalting on site. Each piece awaits the moment of inspiration which allows it to speak to the turner of its particular nature. Bowls with barkedged lips, or cracked and knotted sides hold special interest in that they challenge David to full technical facility.

By accentuating asymmetry and capitalizing ingeniously on the flawed aspect of wood, David defies some of the basic rules of turnery, yet in doing so, he creates a particular quality of Zen-like reverent acceptance that promotes contemplation. He is quick to point out that in the frank acknowledgment of imperfection, perfection is defined. Many of his pieces embody this paradox. Not surprisingly, through his explorations of the distinctions between ceramic throwing and hollow-form turning, David has recently drawn from the repertoire of Oriental form. Works of this type have been exhibited in the public galleries of Penticton, Kamloops, Kelowna and Prince George.

In spite of his geographical isolation, David stays in touch with other woodturners across the continent, participating in the investigative, experimental, and often radically innovative approaches being developed in the field today. His contacts help him to nuture international standards which he frequently shares in workshops, demonstrations, and lectures conducted across the province.

Through his career in turnery, Ron David has gained the reputation of an irascible craft activist. For that reason we are usually pleased that he is our regional representative for B.C. Yellowhead.

## **BOARD BUSINESS**

Report on Board Meetings, April I, and May 6, 1985

Finance Committee reported a considerable increase in shop sales for March, over the previous 2 months, as well as an increase in April sales over March. May has indicated it will be an even better month.

We've had a rash of Shoplifting in April and beginning of May. We hope to eliminate this with the institution of a decorative "wall/maze" type arrangement. This has been a continuing problem on Granville Island.

The Board decided to create a permanent "Sale" area so that members can mark down selected stock whenever they wish. The new area should be functioning by the time you read this.

The shop staff have adopted a maintenance program which includes routine dusting, vacuuming, display changes, etc. We have approved the hiring of a student at minimum wage to do the heavy once a week vacuuming, etc. thus leaving the staff freer to do sales.

We held 3 separate painting parties this month. Many thanks go to Maureen Carey, Barbara Barron, Mas Hori, Anita Morse, Deborah Maguire, Jim Meadows and our old ever-readys, Leah Errington, Suzanne McDermott and me, for performing this extra activity with such zest and elan. The Board has now approved the hiring of a student to do some future painting, but never fear, there will be times we must call on you.

Glass doors for the north entrance have been approved by Granville Island. We will now investigate cost and advise you as progress is made. We discussed the state of the floor. Gr. Isl. will not improve and any painting would be useless as the floor is coated with years of grease. Steam cleaning would be expensive right now, as well as the fact that we would need to close down and clear out the entire place for quite a few days — a potentially high cost in lost revenue. So, we must do our best at keeping it vacuumed for a while.

Some things you may want to know about CC. 1) Circle Craft does not have a permanent lease on the Granville Island premises. Our lease is in fact, on a month to month basis. Therefore we are sensibly reluctant to make major improvements or renovations to the site. Instead, we concentrate on movable fixtures. 2) CC is still under financial constraints. The situation is improving steadily however, and we hope to be out of debt by late summer. Thanks go to hard work by the Board, staff and the Granville Island Trust who let us use the site rent free for our most difficult 3 months last summer. Also thanks to our members who continued to support us throughout.

4) We are currently in the midst of defining and improving the "gallery" area as evidenced by the purchase of a new carpet, as well as planning the purchase of better display units for the entire shop.

Welcome Bettina Lewis who is our new part-time staff member in the shop. Her smiling face and sunny disposition is a welcome sight. Bettina previously ran 2 stores in New York, is proficient in shop design and display. She began as a batik artist and is now concentrating on oil painting

Also, welcome to our new Co-op Co-ordinator, Jane Saywell. As well as teaching in a French school in Peking, Jane was employed in Toronto for the Ministry of Community and Social Services for 10 years. First as a field worker responsible for 300 families; then as supervisor over 13 field workers and finally as Income Maintenance for the SW Toronto area. Jane is well travelled having lived in Hong Kong for 2 years, and Peking for 2 years. Although relatively new to the craft field, Jane brings organizational skills and enthusiasm that will be of great value to the membership.

Regarding member re-jurying during the month of June, don't forget to get your best work into the shop by June Ist.

Plans for the Xmas Market were drawn up at a meeting with Gail Ford, Sam Carter, Penny Povey, Leah Errington and myself. Many members wrote or phoned in suggestions in response to the March 20th Xmas Showcase letter and this input was invaluable. As space is limited and as application forms are on their way to you, here are brief highlights:—We will have approx. 15 booths per session (3 one week sessions) positioned around the perimeter of the consigment area. We are having a fashion "event" on opening night, an Imagination Market children's area, floral club displays. Please, don't inundate us with calls until you receive your full application form which details all of the above. Non-members are welcome to apply. Please phone 669-8021 and ask for an application form to be sent to you.

The staff receive this discount now and I feel that the Board works so hard for relatively little thanks, that we needed at least the illusion of some material benefit. So — we've voted ourselves a 25% increase in pay. Any feedback?

I think a large vote of thanks is overdue to the CC staff, a hard working, devoted bunch who have a unique on-the-job problem of trying to satisfy approx. 200 employers... we members. Many of them put in long volunteer hours and are doing the work of two, at as low a pay as most of we craftspeople are making. Dedication indeed.



One is by an American, Penny McMorris, who stridently insists that crazy quilts are the American contribution to the quiltmaking Arts. The Canadian, Mary Conroy, on the other hand in her excellent introduction, doesn't seem to be concerned overly much about who can claim to have made the very first quilt of this genre. Her book is modest, with excellent instructions on how to create objects of crazy patchwork, including a great variety of stitches, but the illustrations and projects are not very exciting. The American book on the other hand is opulent, well researched and expensive. The illustrations are outstanding and will make you consider crazy quilts as interesting, viable pieces even if you have here-to-fore rejected them. Her thesis is that fashion in decor is moving away from the pristine white paint and glass box to a more comfortably cluttered environment into which crazies fit well.
