Artists entering juried contests have to bear in mind the above mentioned "facts of life" of these kind of competitions. Also, they have to realize that the possibility of being rejected does not mean the end of their career nor does it mean they should never enter another juried show. Competitions are challenges that can inspire new ideas and motivate artists to do their best work. Remember, also, that "what is poison for one juror can be meat for another," and if you are rejected there is always the next upcoming competition with different jurors.

WHAT'S HAPPENING ON GRANVILLE ISLAND?

The Island is self-supporting with operating costs paid out of revenues received from the Island with the balance invested in capital projects, programming and advertising. This year we will complete **Building 72** adjacent to the Morris Steel parking structure which is being upgraded for manufacturing uses. Leases have been negotiated with two tenants for space in the building. These include **Feathercraft**, an existing company on the Island who makes collapsible kayaks and river boats, and a new tenant, **Joel Berman**, who specializes in sandblasted and fused glass. The third workshop in the building will be leased during the summer after it has been used to house the Comedy Festival crew. The space will be available mid-September.

Building 59 at the corner of Old Bridge Street and Cartwright Street will be upgraded this year and leased to the Granville Island Woodworkers. Building 78 located in front of the Community Centre, presently occupied by Feathercraft will also be upgraded for artisan use. This space has not been let at this time and we look forward to enquiries about this space. Monies will also be expended on the upgrading of the Island infrastructure; paving, lighting, bollards and landscaping.

Editorial

We've had a number of replies from our members regarding the topic of last month's editorial, the I.A.C. Competition. It appears that many craftspeople in B.C. received the entry forms for this competition. First of all, we'd like to reassure

you that the CABC does not and never has made your names and addresses available for mailing lists. So we really don't know how the I.A.C. obtained this information. Also, I am informed by Diana Lam, a supporter and friend of the CABC, that the \$50 charge for foreign currency is not out of line. About the competition itself, Stephen Denslow, a well-known Vancouver artist, came forward with some first-hand information. He entered and was accepted by this event 2 years ago. The following were some of his impressions:

"After notification of my acceptance in the show, I travelled to New York City to oversee the installation of my work (travel expenses were borne by myself). The I.A.C. had grouped the works by media in the art galleries. The galleries were too small to properly display the large number of works that were accepted. In fact, the word "crowded" comes to mind. I won 1st prize in my category and was overall winner of the competition, for which I received \$100, a medal, a certificate, and quite a large, ugly trophy. The jurors of the show were not the jurors advertised on the I.A.C.'s brochures. I paid for both the transporting and insuring of my work to and follow-up publicity for the winners but nothing has materialized yet. The I.A.C. received over 11,000 entries for this same competition for which the entry fee was \$5.00 for each slide.

On the positive side, I really did enjoy the experience of meeting other artists from around the world and seeing some of the quite incredible work on show at the galleries. Also, it was a real honour for me to have work chosen as overall winner among such talented entries."

So, readers, I hope the above will help you reach your own conclusions about this competition. If you are serious about entering this competition or any other one, we will try to assist you at 687-6511 or check them out with the Canadian Crafts Council at 613/235-8200 or the American Crafts Council at 212/956-3535. Once the Canada-wide Circuit network of computers is set up between the provincial craft associations, we'll be able to check these competitions out for you in greater detail.

Thank you to all who responded with information about this event, and a big thank you to Stephen Denslow for candidly sharing his knowledge with us.
