B.C. SCULPTOR EXHIBITS WORK IN D.C.

The work of British Columbia glass sculptor (Ms.) Lou Lynn was recently featured in a month-long one-person show at the Anne O'Brien Gallery in Washington, D.C. The 12 sculptural pieces in the show were evenly divided between purely glass works and ones either combining glass and aluminum, or cast in aluminum only.

The pieces in Lynn's show represented the results of six months of work. The purely glass pieces were a continuation of Lynn's signature layered and fused glass sculpture. This is a direction the artist has explored for several years now, and the current pieces represent the maturity of this series.

The aluminum-and-heavy-plate-glass pieces represent Lynn's newest direction. The new work is larger, more massive than anything Lynn has produced previously. The artist explains she sees this work as having archaeological echoes. "I think of these pieces as sculptural 'implements' of the twentieth century," she says.

Gallery director Anne O'Brien expressed that she was extremely pleased with Lynn's work, saying that she'd never received so many favourable comments on a show in her gallery before.

Somewhat closer to home, Lynn will be showing her glass-and-aluminum work in the "National Glass Invitational Exhibition" at the Robert Kidd Gallery in Birmingham, Michigan in April.

Dorothy Caldwell, a fabric artist from Ontario, has been presented with the 1990 Saidye Bronfman Award for Excellence in the Crafts. The \$20,000 award is one of the largest grants offered in Canada.

DESIGN VANCOUVER BULLETIN

Success, success! Design Vancouver Week 1990 opened Friday night, February 9 with over 700 guests. The formal debate the next night between Arthur Erickson and Ray Spaxman drew over 500. There was an energy about the week that emphasized the need for this kind of event for not only professionals, but also for the various publics. In spite of heavy rain, then heavy snow, and in spite of the incredibly difficult access to the Roundhouse, the draw continued.

International speakers James Woudhuysen and Peter Lawrence brought a perspective that broadened the understanding of the business of design and its global nature. Important connections are being made at the UBC School of Commerce, Board of Trade, provincial and federal government, and inch by inch with business and manufacturing.

The next step for Design Vancouver is to secure a sustained office, which means an active fundraising campaign over the next two months. We need to demonstrate to the governments that the disciplines are behind Design Vancouver. Some time ago a discussion was made not to structure a membership and a fee for professionals, as we already pay fees to our professional organizations. What we need is the volunteer support of the professional. Design firms and design resource firms in the various disciplines will be approached to financially support a three year plan which will allow Design Vancouver to operate, and which will provide a vehicle for matching funds from the governments for specific projects. My idea is that portfolios be returned to the craftsperson at regular intervals (e.g., every 2 years, or 3 or 5—your choice) if they have not been voluntarily updated. Included in the package would be the necessary forms for updating and request for a fee to cover the handling and postage (e.g., \$5.00).

Since relocating to a studio with an attached retail outlet, I've been swamped with business and requests to whole sale to other shops. I can't possibly accept any of these requests or the recent ones from persons viewing the portfolio registry. I do still believe in being on file and would like my file updated—but I want to see it all myself! Are you willing to send the lot to me? If not it will have to wait for the chance I'll be in Vancouver during your business hours sometime during the year.

BUILT-IN COMPETITION FOR CANADIAN CRAFT MUSEUM

The Cartwright Gallery, a nine-year-old non-profit craft gallery on Vancouver's Granville Island, will expand into a new downtown building designed for its use as the Canadian Craft Museum in late 1991. Funds will be raised to commission craftspeople across Canada, selected by competition, to design and make both freestanding furniture for public areas, and art to be integrated into the 10,000 sq. ft. building. Architect Paul Merrick has incorporated into the building's facade art deco terracotta ornament salvaged from the building previously on the site. The building's gallery space—a great high ceilinged hall with a mezzanine gallery suspended over one end and side—will require a similar refinement of design detailing. A tall arched opening at the end of the great hall provides an interior focal point, and will be faced with additional terracotta art deco tiles. Following is a brief listing of projects that the CCM expects to commission or purchase:

Furniture commissions/purchases include:

- a large reception desk/work station to accommodate a guard and a receptionist and their computer and security monitoring equipment;
- benches/chairs for public seating in galleries;
- eight "visitor" chairs for offices;
- three tilt-top tables, 40" by 9' tops;
- display furniture for small retail shop;
- twenty stacking chairs for boardroom;
- four office desks;
- lectern incorporating speaker and amplifier.

Other wood commissions may include carved handrails for stairs; carved or inlaid interior doors or folding walls, panels listing donors, lamps for desks.

Glass commissions include:

- an edge-lighted glass wall inside the front entrance;
- a transom for an exterior door;
- an interior wall for the vestibule, 20% transparent (perhaps incorporating donor names);
- wall sconces
- lamps for desks.

Ceramic possibilities:

- wall art for four stair landings;
- tile counters and/or tile friezes in three washrooms;
- wash basins for three washrooms;
- floor tiles incorporating donor names (possible collaboration with calligrapher) or donor wall;
- lamps for desks.

Metal:

- door pulls for three exterior doors;
- elevator exterior doors (possibly engraved or enamelled metal).

Fibre: fabrics for window coverings and upholstery.

Various materials: exterior and exterior signage; refuse containers and ash urns with linters for interior use; exterior planters; window coverings.

Craftspeople who wish to be considered for such commissions/purchases should send a sheet of slides showing work similar to that proposed for commission, a current resume and other supporting information (articles and exhibition reviews, catalogues, etc.) by June 1, 1990. Plesae state what commissions you wish to be considered for, along with any preliminary concepts you may have. All entrants will be notified by June 30. Two or three artists may be chosen to develop concepts for each major commission, and will be paid design fees if required.

Artists selected initially by the museum director, architect and an artist trustee of the CCM will receive a package from the CCM that will include an exterior drawing of the building, appropriate interior drawings, dimensions and other requirements for commissions, CCM membership application and agreement for preparation of a detailed proposal, including commitment for a design fee and proposed budget for completed work.

Accepted artists must deliver to CCM by September 1, 1990, drawings detailing the artist's proposal for the commission, processes/materials to be used, and cost of the work delivered/installed. A production/delivery schedule for

each accepted project, and payment schedule, will then be negotiated with each artist with the exception that built-in an must be available for installation in January, 1991, and free-standing objects must be delivered to the Gallery in March, 1991.


