
Metal Garden

ne admires the unmistakable style and presence that indicates consistency in a craftsperson's work. Metal Garden has achieved this, but as a collaboration between three people. Jennifer Cline, Naomi Levitin-Segal and Francine Keane-Mitchell, who are Metal Garden, have a strong common vision of how their work should evolve. For two years now, they have shared a small studio in the Gastown district of Vancouver. It contains three diminutive workbenches -bristling with all the dentist-like tools of the jeweller, tall windows and a large, black, surprisingly quiet dog who supervises from the far corner.

The three women met while taking the two-year Vancouver Community College jewellery art and design program. They set up the studio (originally with two other women who have since left the group) during the Christmas before their spring graduation, so that they were well underway once their classes were over. In a far-sighted way, they knew it would be more economical to share a space, to pool their considerable talents and energy. All three have bread and butter issues, including student loans, to wrestle with. They hold other 'day' jobs, but are committed to steadily building a solid reputation for Metal Garden. While each person was new to the jeweller's art upon beginning the VCC training, each contributed a different aspect to the work: Cline, from Vancouver, a background in fine arts and literature; Keane-Mitchell, from Perth, Australia, a fascination with natural forms and motifs as well as graphic art experience; Levitin, from Israel, the visual experience of Middle Eastern and North African culture and a background in industrial design.

Their work is full of rounded, organic shapes and has surface details inscribed, applied or pierced into the metal. The quality of line is reminiscent of Art Nouveau, but with more spontaneity. Silver is their metal of choice, partly as it is more affordable for them, in the initial cash outlay, and their customers as reflected in the retail price, but also out of weight considerations. Metal Garden hopes to find a balance between budget and aesthetics. While small, some of the pendants shaped like hearts, tubular half-rounds or lyre-like forms, would be remarkably heavy and pricey if worked in gold. The sculptural forms are often the enclosure for a tiny gem, as the lines are often the stems for inlaid gold leaves. The Metal Gardeners use 18 karat gold for its lustre and quality. Some of the pendants have doors on minute hinges, making one feel curious about their contents but also acutely aware of another scale. The microcosm of cut out shapes on a silver ring, or the room in a hollow heart contain tiny mysteries, childhood imaginings, traces of something one must scrutinize and contemplate. When I remarked that the work seemed full of fantasy and practicality at the same time, Cline agreed that one of their



priorities is to be "innovative but not trendy", that the work should capture and transmit sentiment but also be enduring. They want people to enjoy wearing these pieces in their daily lives and cherish them enough to hand down in time.

the collection to showcase it, but also to 'test drive' new pieces. If they find an aspect of a piece that needs fine-tuning physically, it will become evident after wearing it for a while. They make a small run of new works that are sent to stores alongside others that have proven themselves as steady, reliable sellers. New ideas that don't sell are discontinued or adapted. This way the established items support experiments on new work. All the Gardeners maintain that play is essential. They keep sketchbooks and scrapbooks independently, constantly working out ideas which then are fleshed out in a 3-D wax prototype for the others to see. A mold is made, the wax burnt out and the silver cast into the mold. Keane-Mitchell says this can be "great or awful" -great when all goes well and the idea is a hit, awful when the process goes awry and the original is destroyed. The silver can be melted down and reused, but the investment of time has been lost. Still, each person understands that without this creative adventuring, "stepping away from the pressure" as Cline puts it, the work and the collaboration will stagnate. Part of Metal Garden's success is in their promotional strategy. They wear work from the control of the control ork from

Metal Garden sells their work in a number of outlets in Vancouver including Chachka's on Robson, Hill's in Kerrisdale, the Vancouver Art Gallery and Canadian Craft Museum gift shops and Crafthouse. They also have work in a shop in Whistler, in the Art Gallery of Ontario, and in some shops in the U.S. They cited the CABC resource centre as being helpful in finding outlets and each partner, on any personal trip, is expected to do a little research on outlets in the area. They put continuous effort into their promotional material with the understanding that it is often a retailer's or customer's first introduction to the work. They attempt to tailor the packages they send to specifically

suit the place and clientele. When the partnership was originally formed, they brainstormed and came up with the name "Metal Garden Designs". Before long, the word 'designs' was dropped, as they found people calling them for garden trellises and plant holders.



Once a week, all three women meet to discuss ideas, designs, opportunities and the nitty gritty of capital expenditures and budgeting. Their long-term goal is to make a living from the work and to continue to educate the public as to the process and traditions of their jewellery. Often, it is discouraging for them, when people come up with lines such as "Why is this so expensive? It's only silver!". The Gardeners object to the consumerist quest for a 'quick fix' when the item has the potential to last for generations. The partnership which Metal Garden represents gives each member creative and financial support, as well as a greater momentum than if they worked separately. Keane-Mitchell is due to have a baby in the new year, a challenge and inspiration for any creative person. Certainly the big black dog has done a wonderful job of overseeing the metal garden operations. I predict he will guard his new associate with equal

As I approach the first 6-month milestone of my new position with the CABC, I am pleased to report that the transition period has been relatively smooth. Many projects have been ongoing throughout the fall, and several new activities are currently in the planning stages for the coming year. Beginning in the fall of 2000 with the volunteer assistance of Shashi Kamboh for 6 weeks on a work experience program, and continuing with the amazing dedication of Vanessa Radunz, the Resource Centre's books have been catalogued, and the creation of a directory for the publications is underway. It is our vision to have the many articles categorized in order to increase accessibility to the vast amount of information contained in the Resource Centre. Look for these additional listings on the website later this year.

In October, I was able to attend the Annual General Meeting of the Canadian Craft Federation in Ottawa, a national advocacy group for craft. This provided me with the timely opportunity to meet other provincial crafts associations' representatives and learn more about the issues facing other provincial organizations. The CCF is spearheading a US Market Survey for Canadian Fine Craft which will be undertaken by the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (DFAIT) through the Canadian Consulates in key cities in the US. The intent of this survey, initiated by the CABC's Cherryl Masters in the spring of 2000, will be to generate a detailed list of galleries/shops interested in carrying or representing fine craft from Canada, including their criteria and submission information. This survey is scheduled to take place in 2001. The CCF works on other activities at the national level, including assistance for the development of a

federal government strategy for the cultural trade sector. A key role of the CCF continues to be the facilitation of communication between the provincial craft councils, providing a much-needed vehicle for information exchange and support.

In the immediate future, Jo Darts and I will be attending the Canadian Consulate's EXTUS Mission to the San Francisco International Gift Show (early February). We anticipate this trade show to be the next focus of our ongoing wholesale trade show initiative, and will be providing a full report of our findings in the next issue of Craft Contacts. In conjunction with this, the CABC plans to host several mini-workshops to assist our members with marketing and exporting. Check the website and future issues of Craft Contacts for more information as it becomes available.

Speaking of the website, the CABC continues to move forward with the production of a new member's gallery section on our existing website. Please see the separate article in this issue for more information, and send in the enclosed registration form to ensure your participation! Note that the participation fees have been decreased from the amounts originally publicized.

Internally, the CABC is upgrading the point-of-sale system used in Crafthouse, and with the computers now networked, the reporting, accounts receivable and accounts payable systems will be much streamlined. The Board of Directors is addressing the committee structures currently in place, with the intent to increase Board Member's participation in the organization on an ongoing basis. Saidye Bronfman Award

winner of the prestigious Saidye Bronfman Award at a ceremony held in conjunction with the One of a Kind Gift Show in Toronto. The five finalists announced earlier in the fall included Michael Hosaluk (wood turner), Gordon Peteran (artist & furniture maker), Ann Roberts (ceramic sculptor) and Ione Thorkelsson (glass artist). On November 23, 2000, Peter Fleming (furniture maker) was announced as the

Peter Fleming defines himself as a designer-maker, rather than an artist, embodying the two familial influences of his father's graphic design background and his grandfather's love for making things. After graduating from Sheridan College's School of Crafts and Design in 1983, Fleming's early pieces reflected a postmodern influence and utilized the woodworking skills he developed while enrolled in a short, but intense, cabinetmaking program at Toronto's Humber College. a new simplicity, characterized by a combination of Baroque and mid-twentieth century Modernism, embodying the use of such rich materials as slate, cast bronze, glass and wood veneers for their enduring nature as did the Baroque cabinetmakers with stone, metal and glass. An important aspect of Fleming's work is his use of veneers which allow him to create large, unbroken surfaces and curvilinear elements. More recently, Fleming's work has embraced

nitially the Holiday Season did not pan out to be what we expected. However the week between Christmas and New Year was fruitful enough to send sales over budget. This has given us our best Holiday Season, and year, ever. The year 2001 is Crafthouse's 15th anniversary and our thanks go to all who have made this milestone possible!

Crafthouse welcomes a number of new craftspeople as a result of the October jury. Connie Paul has been lampworking beads for six years. We have accepted her jungle theme lariats, bracelets and necklaces. Kathy Kristmanson creates red brass and silver jewellery whose imagery springs from a fascination with cave paintings and animal life. At the conclusion of the October clock

exhibition, Crafthouse retained a mosaic clock by Adrian Fehr. Adrian has background in multi-media sculpture and installation. Bright turquoise and blue glazes pull the eye to the pots by Sharon Grove of Bussard Grove Pottery. She became a potter in 1992 and is very active in the lower mainland potters' associations. Kate Barber is a weaver who combines wool and silk in block patterns to make scarves. The scarf is then washed which felts the wool areas leaving a seersucker effect. Cindy Anderson has returned to pottery after a long hiatus. She makes porcelain bowls fired to cone 6, often modified by carving out a filigree pattern in the sides. A recent exhibition at Circle Craft brought my attention to the work of Renee Evans. Her background in fashion and textiles has combined to create very exciting work. Crafthouse has her scarves which are created by felting and then fulling lengths of silk chiffon with islands of fleece. The piece is handpainted with dye and then steamed to set the colour.



M ulti-media work by textile artist
Suzanne Summersgill is the focus of

Simplicity and minimalism inform her work. She approaches her subject matter in a direct fashion and she acts in a spontaneous manner facilitating open expression. Children's attitudes towards expression and life are a large focus of the exhibit. She employs the idea that truths are expressed by children after their careful thought. Loose, gestural movements in drawing are one way of expressing lessons about life. Within her work, imagination is respected in the development of thought. New frontiers are explored in the pieces by opening up the viewer to their imaginations. Her work uses highly iconic imagery that is raw and very schematic. The work, in many areas, looks


very topographical and leads the viewer's eye throughout each work like an explorer in a new terrain. Some of the imagery reminds viewers of childhood experiences when they developed their own prints for the first time in early elementary school. being held in an appropriate locale, Vancouver, and at a perfect time of the year, March, both known for copious amounts of rain. Water can be celebrated in its many forms. It is often perceived by people through the form of rain but it can equally be celebrated in other states such as majestic waterfalls which carry the thunder and vibrations of rushing water over a long distance. Water is highly visual but can also be perceived through sound, and often rain evokes memories of times people have spent in intimate environments seeking refuge from it. As children, many of us have played in it

Water marks cycles in life and civilization, and from birth to death; it nourishes many things including people, crops and nature. There is a highly emotive and symbolic notion of water in how it transforms nature, usually in a very positive way. Its fundamental qualities allow for growth. It comes in cycles and facilitates the cycles of growth in many organisms. Life cannot exist without the presence of at least some minimal level of water. Crops can flourish only with sufficient amounts of water. The human body is largely composed of water. Birth is also at least partially based on the presence of water in the environment.
Rainforests have flourished and hold many
unique species of animals and other forms of
life largely due to large levels of water.

Water affects the way we perceive the world by creating rich, diverse hues in nature. Investigate the many different interpretations of water by these highly skilled and leading edge craftspeople.



Rautiainen are featured in the exhibit "Spring Twines." The show focuses on expressions of light and birth captured in woven boxes of pine needles, flax, and twigs as well as with linen tapestries. Her work expresses lightness both in weight and how the objects themselves cast delicate and sophisticated shadows. Her work explores growth through strong expressive lines that draw the eye upward. The twigs within her boxes give a sense of being connected to the earth, yet through her arrangement also appear to be celebrating life through their dramatic movement. There is an almost emotional relationship between the loose gestural arrangement of the twigs and the more serene contemplative nature of the flax and pine needles that make up the woven boxes. rganic and structured woven boxes

Her work emphasizes the integration between organic components and structured environments. Her craft also explores containers as manipulations, developments, and life processes of organisms. Her oeuvre ranges from highly structured boxes with tightly unified twigs combined with the flax and pine needles to more expressive boxes that allow the twigs greater freedom. The idea of containers can be extended to the practice of keeping plants as one would see in a domestic interior. In this instance, however, the container is architecturally coalesced with its contents. The container can also be read by the viewer in terms of birth with the twigs emerging from the darker and more enclosed habitat of the containers into the open air reaching toward the heavens.

analyzes how we use different senses in appreciating craft. Time plays an important role within these woven boxes. This time can be related in nature to cycles from birth through life and back to death. Time can also be related to the weaving and tapestry process which requires huge amounts of time, dedication, and patience to produce highly elaborate, carefully considered final fibre works. This union of time in nature and human and creative process plays a central role within Kaija's craft. Experience the highly sculptural elements within her work that lead to a very strong appreciation of the tactile qualities of these boxes. Her craft looks at the relationship between nature and human nature and people' affinity with the earth. The work also employs visual and tactile elements a
