GALLERIES - CUTTHROAT OR COOPERATION?

There is an increase in the number of visitors to the shop and this continues to grow as summer arrives. Currently there is a good balance of pieces, in different mediums to enjoy. Tourists often make return visits to the shop during their various visits to Vancouver, and this clearly illustrates interest in the work submitted, and their appreciation of Craft. It is extremely satisfying to see people enjoying the shop, and furthering their knowledge and understanding of the concerns of artists/craftspeople. There is good reason to feel optimistic about the acceptance of Craft, and all those who have shown their work have been vital in informing the public and broadening their awareness.

A debt is owed to **Provincial Essays Gallery** for the important role it played in this communication. This individual and innovative gallery was always informative. Their showing of work of excellent design and execution was an education for many. Best of luck to Neil and Russel, who have decided to move on to new projects.

Recently a conversation among a few craftspeople regarding the sale and promotion of their work focused on the issue of 'exclusive representation' by galleries and shops. There was an exchange of many ideas and various policies. Two important points were agreed upon:

 The artist/craftsperson should not feel coerced or pressured into agreeing to be 'exclusive' if they are faced with making this decision.

The gallery or shop should be able to provide maximum promotion and support of artist and work if they insist on exclusivity.

It is interesting to note that work seen in more than one venue, even within close proximity, can often serve as a reinforcement of the creator's concerns, and their existence as a working artist/craftsperson. I often see people 'recognize' work in a very positive way. Another advantage is, obviously, the provision of a greater selection of work to the public. With some responsibility as to choice and number of pieces shown, there should be no danger of 'flooding' the market or work becoming too familiar.

At Crafthouse, we are pleased to refer our customers elsewhere if they have not found the right piece by a particular artist. Knowing an artists' other venues is essential in being able to provide this serivce. There is opportunity for all venues to work supportively with each other on behalf of craftspeople concerning these issues.

Profile

THE BRONFMAN SERIES: ROBIN HOPPER

Robin Hopper's house is full of other people's pottery. To a visitor like myself, the display of beautiful objects, expressive of their individual creators, also says something about their collector, who reveals himself as an artist whose own work subsists within a passionate commitment to the medium. For Hopper, artists who work with clay are participating in a venerable tradition which provides indisputable evidence of man's desire to beautify the practical, to make art out of the ordinary. By collecting others' work, Hopper pays homage to that tradition in an unselfconscious gesture of admiration for his fellow artists.

Robin Hopper was awarded the first Saidye Bronfman Award for Excellence in the Crafts in 1977, and as we sat, ten years later, in the dining room of his beautifully restored house, I wasn't surprised to find a man who revealed himself as a dedicated spokesman for the ceramic tradition, stressing the importance of the award in chipping away at the largely erroneous line between art and craft, by conferring the prestige of a wealthy family's patronage of artists working outside of what is loosely termed "fine art."

"The Director of the Bronfman Foundation, Peter Swann, who is also an Asian scholar, must have told the Bronfman kids about the way Japan honours its finest living artists by inferring upon them the status of 'Japanese National Living Treasure'," said Hopper. "In Japan there are no two words equivalent to 'art' and 'craft': there is no use in drawing distinctions, because the work itself transcends arbitrary definitions. The Bronfman kids were impressed by that, and thought of something similar to mark Saidye's 80th birthday. I think the Bronfman Award aimed to achieve the same thing in Canada, to set a standard of excellence for artists who might not have been recognized otherwise."

According to Jane Mahut, Director of the Koffler Gallery in Ontario, the award money given to Robin Hopper to assemble an exhibition of current work, did just that. "In 1977 public galleries in Canada generally did not exhibit contemporary ceramics: it was considered "craft" and relegated to craft or community galleries. It was Hopper's exhibition and accompanying catalogue that broke this pattern. The landmark exhibition was hosted by the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria with the subsequent tour arranged by the Walter Phillips Gallery's Director, Barry Morrison. This acceptance by a major gallery marked a turning point in the studio move-

ment across the country." (from Robin Hopper-Ceramic Explorations, page 3)

But how, I wondered, did the award affect Hopper him-

"Well, it came as a complete surprise. It was a great shot in the arm, as far as I was concerned. You have to always remain sensitive to your own mistakes, but retain faith in yourself, and the award really helped with that. I think, too, it brought to mind the whole question of publicity, selling your work, marketing yourself, and helped with the idea of breaking new ground, doing away with insecurity."

"I think I benefited a bit from initial treatment, as far as being the first to get something is concerned. We went to the Bronfman's house in Westmount in Montreal, for dinner. It was more of a castle than a house, of course, and my wife and I were met at the door by a couple of footmen in white gloves and escorted through this fabulous hall with 11th century Chinese vases on little tables, to meet Saidye herself.

"She was sitting on a chesterfield looking extremely pleased with the whole evening, absolutely surrounded by the most extraordinary objects of art: 9th century Islamic ceramics, Roman glass, Chinese jade, and originals on the wall I recognized as 'old friends' from textbooks!"

"I went up and said how honoured I was to be the first recipient of the award, and how much I enjoyed seeing her collection, and she was very gracious and said to go ahead and take a tour and enjoy the objects, not to worry about the rest of the guests as most of them were in fact, quite boring!"

"Later on I sent her one of my pieces and she wrote and told me how she had 'put it between the Rodins because they seemed to be good company,' so I felt pretty good about that."

For an artist who has spent so much time studying, writing and teaching about all aspects of his craft, it is not surprising that he should feel the recognition of his peers, ensuring the ongoing quality of his work, as the most important ramification of the award. "What did I do with the money?" Hopper smiles and looks upward. "I built the roof with it, having learned at the time that the builder's estimate was over my humble means, by almost exactly that amount!" Having ensured his safety from the elements, Hopper settled himself in Victoria to put together the show he would entitle, **Explorations within the Landscape** which gained wide recognition across the country.

At first he says, there was relatively little impact on the sale of his work, and he attributes this to scant national publicity, but, "the show provided a lot of visibility, and the whole thing had a kind of spin-off effect. I was lucky, and this is partly due to my medium, that new found recognition did not drive up my prices to the extent that people would no longer buy my pieces. I think that was a problem for **Lois Bettridge**, who found that after the award people expected her jewelry to be so expensive they wouldn't even think about buying it." Hopper's exhibition, based on his impressions of the Canadian landscape as he drove west to Victoria from Toronto, was a perfect vehicle to generate public interest across the country. Even down to glaze recipes made with local ingredients garnered along the way, the work reflected a sen-

sitive artist, finely tuned to Canada's infinitely varied, regional landscapes, who not only saw, but felt, his natural surround-ings

Agate ware was bent into seashell forms, or shaped into cylindrical pieces with the dramatic striations found in core samples drilled out of the earth; neriage bowls depicted Aurora Borealis, slab vases with multiple glazes became small Turneresque canvases, and "Forest Form" vases looked like they were plucked from under a fallen cedar.

All of the pieces in the "Exploration" show are like minicanvases, impressionist landscapes on organic forms. Hopper's decorative vocabulary, the endless experimentation with thousands of glaze recipes, always harks back to the earth, organic forms always remind one of the fundamental rhythms, the complete balance of nature.

Hopper spoke of the Bronfman award as having a spinoff effect on his work and his success as a self-supporting
artist. It is difficult to say, ten years later, if the unprecedented
success of his last retrospective show, where attendance
broke records at the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria, would
have occurred as a natural result of a talented artist's
maturity, but also because, thanks to Saidye, Robin Hopper
had become a little at home with the Rodins.
