### FIRST THURSDAY ART NIGHT

February 1, 1990 was the launch date of a new city-wide visual arts event, taking place on the first Thursday evening of each month in most Vancouver art galleries and museums—Crafthouse included. From 5 until 8 pm, participating galleries are open to the public: some will host small receptions, and some will hold their regular openings on First Thursday nights.

The project has been based on Seattle's very successful version of First Thursday. In 1984, several Victory Square gallery owners decided it would make good sense to co-ordinate their monthly openings. They publicized this regular event by mailing a "tabloid" style promotional paper to a target group constructed from their pooling mailing lists. Over the years this event has grown in scope and popularity, so that it now includes "Second Thursday" art lectures and discussions in local restaurants, a greatly expanded group of participating galleries, regular media attention, and widespread attendance. First Thursday has raised the profile of the visual arts communities in Seattle enormously, simply by making gallery attendance simpler and more convenient, and by presenting visual art in an entertaining, accessible and stimulating context.

Chris Tyrell from the Vancouver Cultural Alliance thought Vancouver would benefit from a similar First Thursday project, and began to research its feasibility here. Initial contacts were made with a small group of galleries in Spring 1989, and it was estimated, at that time, that about 10 galleries would be interested in participating. In September of this year, Christine Elving Lucas, the Community Liaison for the CVA, began the organizational groundwork, making all the necessary contacts and setting up a system that subsequent Employment Training grant people could follow

with ease. Gallery and museum owners and directors were far more responsive to the project than initial plans had indicated. Finally more than forty galleries and museums have decided to take part in this event. It's bound to be an immediate success.

#### Editorial

On February 16 and 17 I will be attending a professional newsletter publishing seminar at SFU, Harbour Centre. The workshop begins with an analysis of newsletter goals to help in the planning of short and long-term objectives, then takes participants step-by-step from outline to blueline: practical solutions to common problems which occur at the planning, editorial, production and distribution stages are covered, as well as strategies for implementing new ideas and procedures. If you would like a particular issue addressed at the seminar, please contact me.

Having come upon another decade, we are reminded of the importance of reaccessment and improvement of ourselves and of our "organizations." With regard to the latter, from where I sit at the CABC, that which is in most desperate need of help is the portfolio registry.

This file is *actually* of a great interest to the public. I stress this point because I have come to believe that our members think the contrary is true. My belief is based on the incomplete nature of the file. Less than 25% of our members have submitted slides and resumes to the file. This is particularly disheartening given the registry is more or less useless when incomplete.

The individual looking for a number of artists working in a particular medium is who we direct to the registry. Architects, designers, retail store owners, museum and magazine staff, researchers, teachers and students quite regularly come to the CABC looking for such information. Recently we had a team from Design Vancouver come to our offices looking for names of local artists working in metal. The slides

they looked at dated as far back as 1978—12 years! Frankly, we're becoming more and more reticent to recommend people to look at the registry because of how it makes us look.

Within the portfolio registry lies a strong component for the CABC's growth in the community and ultimately, for your recognition and happiness. It's a service for you. Please look into submitting your resume.






